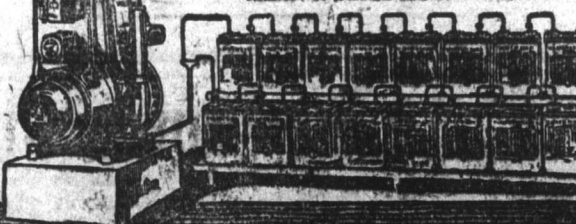

A Great Riverside Fire.

On September 16, 1907, a great

riverside fire broke out in the large saw mills and croosoting works of Messrs. Gabriel and Sons, at Bar-

bar's Wharf, Rotherhithe, which lies between the Surrey Commercial Docks and the Thames. Nearly four

hundred fire boats, with nearly two hundred firemen, were at work from nine o'clock in the morning until late at night, and although they succeeded in saving the adjacent property, the damage to the timber yard was estimated at \$25,000. A more

difficult task had not been given to the London firemen since the Tooley Street outbreak, for there was— for many years—the greatest danger of the conflagration spreading to the shipping in the docks and the neigh-

bouring warehouses. Ships lying close to the fire in the Surrey Commercial Dock had to be moved to safety berths, and the London County Council steamers could not approach the Commercial Pier, which was constantly threatened by the flames, and at one time there were even fears for the Metropolitan Asylums Board

Wharf. The great pile of timber and stacks of croosoted railway sleepers, thirty yards long, in which the fire originated, were a roaring mass of flames within a few minutes of the first alarm, and a strong wind fanned the flames to fury. Dense volumes of suffocating smoke rose from the blazing pyre of tar soaked wood, and so intense was the heat, that the firemen, even in smoke helmets, could not at first approach the flames effectively.

In order to cope with the fire from the land side, it was found necessary to hastily erect ramps of timber piled in a battle fashion, and the firemen sheltered behind this bulky safeguard, put their hose through the apertures, and thus played on the flames.

Early, Hard and Long Winter.

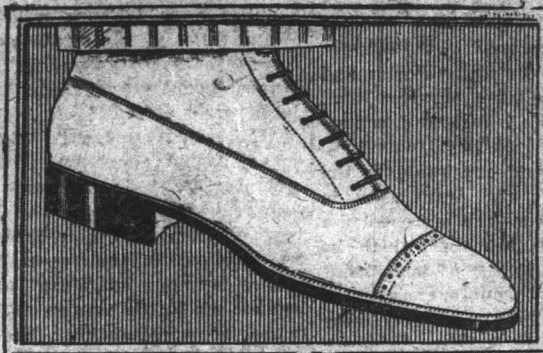
