THE FINANCIAL STATEMENT

How, Mr. Crooks then made his innan-cial statement. After some preliminary remarks he progeeded to explain the financial position-of the Province. Under the British North American Act of 1867, a stipulated amount of the debt of the two Provinces was assumed by the Do-minion, and the excess over thin aimount. devolved upon Ontario and Quebee. This excess was assumed by the arbitration to be nearly ten millions and a half. The interest on this amount was chargeable against the subsidy payable to these Provinces by the Dominion, under the Confederation Act. So that, while in theory we received nearly \$1,200,000 an-mually from the Dominion, there stood as a first charge against that sum the inter-est payable by the Province on this excess of debt, which was assumed to be ton millions and a half, of which fire-iniths was assumed to be Ontario's share, and four-ninths Quebee's share. In other words, according to this assumption the debt of Ontario would be \$5,833,333; and although the province. It must be reformed, however, that this ten mil-lions and a half vas merely an assumed sum. In a discussion in this Legislature the former leader of the Government, the Hon. J. S. Maedoneld, took occasion to say that this amount was only an assum-ed amount, and the then Treasurer ac-quiesced in that, view.
