Reports from the lumbering sections in the Saginaw district are to the effect that nearly two-thirds of the logs put on the skids have been barked and if the present weather continues, with a few inches of snow to freeze the track, nearly all of the logs will be secured. The sun is so high and generally clear that it is difficult to maintain ice roads on which to haul logs."

Asa Larned, a resident of Port Huron since 1852, died on Sunday, aged 82 years. She was a sister of the wife of Wolf Neizgora, a prominent merchant of Ithaca, with whom she has resided for the past two years. She left a letter stating in substance that she was tired of life, etc., and thanked her friends for the privileges they had given her. Miss Solikson was esteemed by all who knew her, and no motive can be assigned for her act."
