Horrible Rites of a "Religious" Sect in Russia.
Dumas Expressed Wishes for a Quiet Burial.

A CRUISER WRECKED.
Rio Janeiro, Nov. 23.—The Brazilian cruiser Uranus has been wrecked and her commander and five others drowned.

STOPPED AT THE STRAITS.
Constantinople, Nov. 23.—The Italian dispatch boat Archimede has arrived at the entrance of the Dardanelles. She has not been allowed to pass in and is now awaiting the instructions of the Italian Government.

ST. ANDREW'S NEW RECTOR.
Edinburgh, Nov. 23.—The Marquis of Bute has been re-elected Lord Rector of the University of St. Andrew's. His opponent was the former Sir Arthur Wellesley Peel, now Viscount Peel, late Speaker of the House of Commons.

DISASTROUS EXPEDITION.
Hamburg, Nov. 23.—A dispatch received here from Auckland, New Zealand, says that the German traveler, Otto Ehlers, has been drowned while taking his expedition across British New Guinea, and that twenty natives belonging to his escort were also drowned. All of his diaries and sketches were lost.

SHEEP SHUT OUT.
London, Nov. 23.—The Board of Agri- culture has issued an order forbidding the importation of sheep from the United States and Canada unless the animals are slaughtered at their port of landing. The order goes into effect on Jan. 1, and is due to the arrival during recent months of many cargoes of sheep which have been infected with scab.

CHILDREN SACRIFICED!
London, Nov. 23.—Near Luga, Russia, the police have discovered a new religious sect, whose meeting take place in the little village church. In the crypt beneath the main floor the bodies of a number of children between the ages of 1 and 2 years were found. This gruesome find furnished evidence of rumors long afloat, that the followers of a new sect sacrificed children from time to time, to please their deity.

A LORD FOR THE COMMONS.
London, Nov. 23.—Lord Warkworth, eldest son of Earl Percy, has been elected to the seat in the House of

Commons for South Kensington, made vacant by the elevation of Sir Algernon Borthwick (now Lord Gloucester) to the peerage. Lord Warkworth, as in the case of his predecessor, is a Conservative, and was elected without opposition.

NO HOPE FOR WILDE.
London, Nov. 23.—The movement among a certain group of Paris litterateurs to obtain the release of Oscar Wilde finds no sympathy here. His recent appearance as a witness in a bankruptcy court made it clear that he had suffered far less severely from his detention than was expected. He was thinner, but quite as healthy looking as when he was at large, and he showed no evidence of nervous weakness.

DREADFUL RUMORS.
London, Nov. 23.—News has been received from Zeittoun that on Nov. 13 a force of 15,000 Armenians, under a Russo-Armenian leader, captured the fort occupied by Turkish troops. In the attack upon the fort dynamite was used by the Armenians with great effect.

This morning the British ambassador is awaiting a reply from London, and the Turkish officials believe the Marquis of Salisbury's grant- ing upon the understanding that nothing is to be done to hinder the efforts of the Sultan in the work of main- taining order, may instruct Sir Philip Currie to send the Drayd away from the Dardanelles. Abdul Hamid ap- pears to have completely lost his head, the public service is entirely disorgan- ized, the Cabinet Ministers are being sent for at all hours of the day and night, and may be said to be in almost constant attendance at the Yildiz Kiosk. Everybody appears to be an- xious and worried, the ambassadors be- ing as tried as everybody else here at the long months of almost fruitless la- bor.

Nearing a Crisis.

A British Gunboat Approaching the Dardanelles,
Although the Sultan Still With- holds His Consent.

Either Britain or Turkey Must Back Down.
The British Ambassador Awaiting In- structions.—The Sultan Frantic.

Constantinople, Nov. 23.—The political situation has again reached a most critical stage here, and it is believed either the Sultan or the British ambas- sador, Sir Philip Currie, must give in within the next 24 hours or trouble will follow.

The Sultan, who is only more thor- oughly under the influence of the Pal- ace party, led by Izzet Bey, still de- clines to grant the firmans applied for by the representatives of Great Britain, Russia, Italy and Austria, for the passage of the extra guard ships through the Straits of the Dardanelles. This is the more extraordinary, as on Tuesday last Tewfik Pasha, the Tur- kish Minister for Foreign Affairs, per- sonally assured Sir Philip Currie that the Porte had determined to grant im- mediately the permission required. The Mussulmans are growing uneasy, as it is being pointed out that the advent of the extra guard ships would be noth- ing less than a warlike demonstration before Constantinople.

SIR PHILIP OBDURATE.
Sir Philip Currie, when assured by Tewfik Pasha that the firmans would be forthcoming, promptly telegraphed to the admiral in command of the British Mediterranean squadron, instruct- ing him to dispatch a gunboat to the Dardanelles, to be used in the Bos- phorus as an extra guard ship at the disposal of the British embassy. As a result, the twin-screw torpedo gun- boat Dryad, 1,070 tons, carrying four 7-inch quick-firing and four 6-pounder quick-firing guns was dispatched to the Dardanelles, and is expected to arrive at Chakalan this morning, and pass right on to the Bosphorus. But per- mission to pass the Straits of the Dar- danelles has not been given, in spite of the assurance of Tewfik Pasha, thus putting Sir Philip Currie in a most em- barrassing position, from which he must either retire by ordering away the Dryad or by insisting that she be allowed to pass in.

The family of M. Dumas have re- ceived a large number of telegrams of sympathy and condolence, among them one from ex-Empress Eugenie, saying: "The death of Alexandre Du- mas is a source of grief to all those who read and think. In assuring his family of my personal sympathy, I ex- press the sentiments which the entire news of the death of this master con- temporary of the theater."

The physicians who attended M. Dumas in his illness announce that a great author succumbed to a spasm affecting the respiratory or- gans. It is stated that the funeral will be purely a civic one, without any religious ceremony.
