CHILDREN SACRIFICED! London, Nov. 29.—Near Luga, Russia, the police have discovered a new religious sect, whose meeting take place in the little village church. In the crypt beneath the main floor the bodies of a number of children between the ages of 1 and 2 years were found. This gruesome find furnished evidence of rumors long affoat, that the followers of the new sect sacrificed children from time to time, to please their deity. It was also established that the same vault where these religious murders took place was used by the sectarians for the celebration of orgies of the most revolting character. Forty-five people were arrested, among whom there were a number of women and three priests of the Orthodox Russian, Church.

NO HOPE FOR WILDE. London, Nov. 29.—The movement among a certain group of Paris litterateurs to obtain the release of Oscar

Wilde finds no sympathy here. His recent appearance as a witness in a bankruptcy court made it clear that he had suffered far less severely from his detention than was expected. He was thinner, but quite as healthy looking as when he was at large, and he showed no evidence of nervous

weakness. Nothing short of absolute imminent danger to his life from further imprisonment would lead to his release, and it is stated by the official authority that his health is fair. Emile Zola refused to sign the petition now being circulated asking for the release of Oscar Wilde.

THE SULTAN'S DELAY. Constantinople, Nov. 29.—The hesitancy of the Sultan in granting permission to the powers to send additional guardships through the Dardanelles, it is understood is due to his fear that the movement of the powers to increase the number of the guardships to mask an ulterior demonstration of the naval force. It is thought, howdemands of the powers in view of the unanimous pressure they are bringing upon him; otherwise it is probable that the powers will send gunboats into the Bosphorus without waiting any longer for the Sultan to issue fir-

mans permitting them to enter.

The answer of the powers to the request of the Porte that they refrain from pressing their demand for the extra guardships was that they could see no reason not to support the demands of their ambassadors for more effective means of protection to foreign residents of Constantinople emergency, and in the presence of the unanimous reply it is considered in foreign official circles that the Sultan has no alternative but to yield.

London, Nov. 29.—The Times prints a dispatch from Constantinople which ascribes the delay in issuing firmans for the entrance into the Bosphorus of a second guardship of each of the powers to Izzet Bey, in whose hands the Sultan placed himself. Izzet will try by every trick to pull his patron through his difficulty. He relies on the fragility of the European concert, and believes that by straining the agreement he can divide the powers and restore the political basis of the em-The Times' correspondent says he believes that the embassies are aware of the designs, and that the knowledge that Izzet is working the affair stiffens the ministers in the demand that the firmans be granted. Iz-
