In Queen's Park—A Rare Old Time

The greatest thing in London today will
be the demonstration by the Young Liberal
Fleet.

If it isn't a success it will be solely due to

Charles Wheeler, organist of St. An-

been pursuing his musical studies in
Leipzig, Germany. In the letter, Mr.
Wheeler says he is getting pretty well
accustomed to German ways and cus-
toms, and things that once seemed so
strange are now allowed to pass un-
noticed. He expresses great satisfac-
tion at having secured the best teach-
ers in Leipzig, from whom he is taking
both conservatory and private lessons.
"This is a great place for students—
both music and university," says Mr.
Wheeler. "We have every opportunity
for study. All the great organs are
produced here, and at the concerts we
hear the best artists in the world. There
are very few Canadians here, but at
every turn you meet English-speaking
students from every quarter of the
globe." During his holidays Mr. Wheel-
er spent a few days in the beautiful
city of Dresden, and then went to Sax-
ony, Switzerland, where he consid-
erable climbing among the rocks. He
treats comments on the drinking capaci-
ties of the German people, and says
that water is valued mostly for washing
and street watering. Mr. Wheeler starts
for home about the end of July, and
will greatly regret leaving Leipzig, where
he expresses delight at the thought of
getting back to St. Andrew's Church
and meeting his many friends.
