The War Situation.

'Amid the maze of conflicting telegrams from the seat of conflict' in South Africa, two lines of policy on the part of the respective antagonists emerge with sufficient clearness.

The policy of the British, under Sir Redvers Buller, is plainly for the moment a waiting game. Every 48 hours from this time forth will add to the strength of the British forces and to the certainty of success under their intrepid and sagacious commander.

On the other hand the game of the Boers is obviously that of pushing the fight as energetically as possible before the arrival of the great mass of reinforcements from Great Britain and other parts of the Empire. The Boers have had every advantage in declaring war at the time that suited them. They have had their plans mapped out, and had provided themselves in advance with ample munitions of war. They have had expert foreign assistance in

strategical operations. They will doubtless continue in the meantime to beleaguer where they can, cut wires, burn bridges, tear up railway tracks, and try to excite the colonial Dutch, as they may, and to raise Old Harry generally before Buller's big force arrives on the scene.

It is impossible to tell what may happen in the interval, which will naturally be one of keen suspense. But the British have a custom of bracing himself and finishing any job to which he applies himself. The final result is not doubtful. These Boers are excellent raw material, out of which good British subjects will be made eventually.

There is the usual talk of foreign intervention, but it will probably come to nothing. With the British Empire, the United States and Germany working together on common lines, even Russia is apt to put on the cap of reflection before intruding an unfriendly paw.

London, Nov. 6. — The war office issued the following at 11:40 last night:

"Buller, to the Secretary of State for War:

"Cape Town, Nov. 5—8:40 p.m.—The commandant at Durban sends the following, receiving from Ladysmith by pigeon post, dated Friday, Nov. 3:

"Yesterday Gen. French went out with cavalry and field artillery and effectively shelled the Boer laager, without loss on our side.

"Lieut. Egerton, of the Powerful, is dead.

"Gen. Joubert sent in Major Kincaid, of the Royal Irish Fusiliers, and nine wounded prisoners. Eight Boers were sent out in exchange, no others being fit to travel.

"Col. Broockleurst, with cavalry, field artillery, the Imperial Light Horse and the Natal Mounted Volunteers, were engaged today with the enemy to the southwest of Ladysmith. The fighting lasted several hours. Our loss was very small.

"The bombardment of Ladysmith continued yesterday and today. Many Boer shells were pitched into the town.

"Today the men were in good health and spirits, and the wounded were doing well."

CAPTURED A BOER CAMP.

London, Nov. 5.—A special dispatch from Ladysmith, filed Thursday afternoon, says: "While the naval brigade was pounding away at the Boer batteries this morning, a party of British cavalry and volunteers were sent out, and, creeping around the hills, they surprised and captured one of the enemy's camps.

FIGHTING ON THURSDAY.

The Times publishes a dispatch from Pietermaritzburg, Natal, dated Nov. 3, which says: "The British residents here have received news of a sanguinary battle fought yesterday (Thursday) probably between Ladysmith and Colenso. A large number of the Boers were killed, many being relatives of the Dutch residing in this place.
