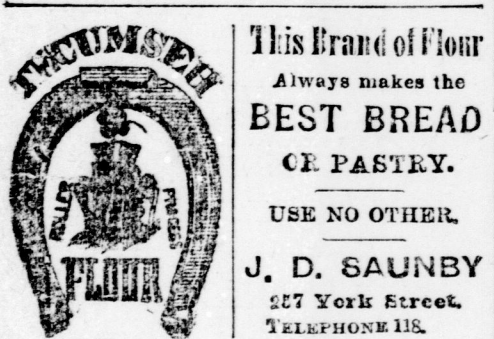

## LONDON AND ENVIRONS.

—Mrs. Mithell, of Westminster township,  
is visiting at W. J. Armstrong's, East  
London.

—Geo. Forsyth, of the T. A. Mara Com-  
pany, of, has been the guest of Mr. and  
Mrs. J. D. Anderson, Essex.

A site for a pesthouse in the city has  
been chosen. The place is kept secret in  
order to spare the feelings of the adjacent  
property-owners.

A meeting of the Middlesex Law Asso-  
ciation was called for yesterday afternoon,  
but as the attendance was very small an  
adjournment was made until to-morrow at  
4 o'clock.

The bankers' ball at the Hotel Ven-  
dome, Sarnia, on Thursday evening, will be  
a swell gathering. The London harpers  
will supply the music. Upwards of 350 in-  
vitations have been sent out.

—Rev. Bernard Bryan, rector of the  
Church of the Epiphany, Parkdale, for-  
merly connected with the ADVERTISER es-  
tablishment, has been compelled to give up  
active work for a time on account of ill  
health. He will be absent for three months.

A circular has been issued by Mr. D.  
Morice, the assistant superintendent of  
the central division of the Grand Trunk  
Railway, instructing that conductors and  
train baggagemen must not permit anyone  
except train baggagemen and express mes-  
sengers to occupy or have access to the  
baggage car. The issuing of the circular  
was the result of the mysterious disap-  
pearance of two valuable express parcels be-  
tween Hamilton and Barrie, which have not  
been recovered.

—St. Thomas Journal: Mr. Charles  
Strong eighteen years ago a resident of  
this city, and who has since lived in Cape  
Town, Africa, wrote to the city on Satur-  
day from London. He reported to the  
police that at Five Stakes he gave a  
stranger a ride. They drove to the Grand  
Pacific Hotel. Then the stranger drove the  
horse around to put it in the barn. Mr.  
Strong reports that that is the last he  
heard of the animal, though he made a  
diligent search through the different hotel  
barns and livery stables yesterday. He  
went out to Talbotville this morning to  
see if he could find the animal.

—Mr. W. H. Minifie was in London this  
week, and had an interview with Mayor  
Essery of that city. Mayor Essery is of  
the opinion that the Grand Trunk is not in  
a position to erect their shops either at  
Sarnia, London or Stratford. The mayor  
told Mr. Minifie that London had offered  
the G. T. R. the running powers over the  
London feature of the Port Stanley road for twenty  
years for a rental of 20 cents, which was  
equivalent to a bonus of over \$200,000, and  
the removal of all obnoxious clauses in the  
other agreement, the only proviso being the  
concentration of all their works west of  
Toronto at London. The fact that the G.  
T. R. hasn't jumped at London's offer is  
taken by Mayor Essery as pretty good  
evidence that they are not in a position to  
accept either of the three offers.—[Sarnia  
Post.

Mendelssohn's Hymn of Praise.

Arrangements for the rendition of Men-  
delssohn's "Hymn of Praise" by the Lon-  
don Choral Society are fast nearing com-  
pletion. The society had a great deal of  
hard work in this composition, which con-  
tains some of the grandest and most diffi-  
cult choruses ever attempted in London,  
while the orchestra, which is a very promi-  
nent feature in the piece, has never attained  
higher results. Every thing points to a  
very successful performance of this great  
sacred cantata on Feb. 15, and it is ex-  
pected that quite a large number of the  
music-loving public will come from the  
neighboring towns to attend the concert.  
After the success gained by the society in  
its initial appearance last season there is no  
doubt that the citizens will turn out in  
sufficiently large numbers to completely  
fill the Opera House.

"Knoxonian" in London.

The Rev. R. N. Grant, D.D., of Orillia,  
is well known throughout Canada, not  
only as an able pulpit and platform man,  
but as writer of extremely sensible and  
witty papers which appear from week to  
week in the columns of the Canada Presby-  
terian under the nom de plume of "Knox-  
onian." In the new First  
Presbyterian Church on Sunday last were  
much appreciated. The powerful evening  
discourse on the faith and trust of Job will  
not soon be forgotten. Last evening he de-  
livered his lecture on "Some Elements of  
Congregational Success." It abounded in  
shrewd suggestions and ray sayings. Al-  
together, Dr. R. N. Grant's visit to  
London last week was a distinct success to  
those interested. Rev. W. J. Clark, the  
pastor, occupied the chair, and Mr. Barron  
conducted the service of song, besides con-  
tributing several organ solos. Miss Lilly-  
white sang a beautiful solo in a charming  
manner. Mr. Fax also gave a solo. The  
attendance was very large.

Fuch Ad About Nothing.

The "Loyal Protestant Women" applied  
to the mayor for the use of the City Hall  
to-night and Thursday in order that Prof.  
Corkery might deliver a couple of lectures.  
The mayor had not power to grant it, and  
called a special meeting of the council last  
night to deal with the request. The  
notice to the aldermen were not sent out  
until late in the afternoon, and consequent-  
ly only seven or eight turned up. The  
others living at a distance naturally  
thought it better to be attending for so  
small a matter. The meeting could do  
nothing without a quorum and adjourned.  
An advertisement containing the names of  
the absentees was sent to the papers, but  
afterwards recalled. The City Hall has  
been filled with several hundred chairs  
preparatory to the lecture, which is ad-  
vertised to be given there.
