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The spectacle of an alderman calling a ratepayer a liar and of the ratepayer daring the alderman "to come outside" and repeat the language, was witnessed at the regular weekly meeting of the board of aldermen last night. He was promised a copy of them and was to the city hall any time through the day.

Ald. Cooper told the committee that this was not the first time he had trouble with Mr. Boles, the latter having once to his store on one occasion and gave him no small amount of abuse.
