THOUSANDS OF REFUGEES. Sofia, Oct. 16. - According to the most moderate estimate there are nov 22,000 refugees in Bulgaria from Mace donia and the vilayet of Adrianople, of whom 19,000 have arrived during the past few weeks. The fugitives are mostly old men, women and children. This exodus is more eloquent than the long lists of atrocities and narratives of hideous cruelties, and refutes unanswerably the assertions of those who are endeavoring to minimize and conceal the happenings in European Turkey.
