Story of a Boer Invasion of Natal Is Not Credited in London-Summary of Canadian Losses in the Hart's River Fight.

London, April 6.-The South African casualty list shows that the losses sustained by the Second Dragoon Guards in their sharp rear guard action with the Boers near Boschman's Kop during the evening of March 31 were severe. Two officers were killed and five were wounded, and eighteen men were killed and fifty-eight were wounded.

CLUBBED THEIR RIFLES. Pretoria, April 6.-Details received duct the negotiations. here of the rear guard action during the night of March 31, between the Second Dragoon Guards, of Col. Lawley's column, and the Boers, near Boschman's Kop, show that a force of 200 British, while endeavoring to surprise a Boer laager on a dark night, rode straight into a force of 500 Boers. The Boers were hidden in a drift and opened fire from almost under the legs of the British horses. A fierce hand-tohand struggle ensued, in which both sides freely used the butt ends of their rifles. The British regained the ridge they had just left and commenced a rear guard action.

ture. On account of the enormous cost of struction of more tunnels for rapid service cars or trains. The decision of the Pennsylvania Railroad Company to abandon bridge plans and construct tunnels under the North and East Rivers and under Manhattan borough, in order to bring its railroad into New York and connect it with the Long Island Railroad, is regarded as a strong argument in favor of more tunnels. between Manhattan and the boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens.

The construction of a double-track rapid transit tunnel from a point near the city hall in Manhattan to a point near the borough hall in Brooklyn, by the most direct route possible, has been suggested as a provision for the future that should be planned without delay. Such a tunnel would cost about \$2,000,000, it is said, a mere fraction of the cost of enlarging the terminal facilities of the Brooklyn bridge, according to the plan recommended by Bridge Commissioner Lindenthal and it would relieve the pressure upon the Brooklyn bridge to an extent immeasurably greater than would be possible increase in the terminal facilities of the bridge.
