Detroit, Sept. 14.—If James McAlleer really wished to ascertain just what his prospects for 1909 were capable of doing, he couldn't have picked a better team than the Tigers to develop the information.

Yesterday the leader of the Browns sent his club against the Champions with five recruits in its make-up. All of the outfield and the battery positions were filled by youngsters, and the weaknesses and ability of the quintette, Detroit brought out in glaring style.

Boosted Tigers' Percentage.

Besides giving the St. Louis manager a chance to judge of his material, the contest added just three points to the Tigers' total in the percentage column, and also afforded the latter an excellent opportunity for enlarging their batting averages, 14 hits being registered by the league leaders during the afternoon.

Every Tiger except Killian got at least one hit. Cobb hammered out a home run and Starnage twice smashed for triples.

George Mullin Twirled.

Upon Mullin fell the duty of leading the Tigers to victory. George didn't have to exert himself in doing it, but he succeeded in holding the rejuvenated outfit to four hits in seven innings. Detroit had a lead of five runs when Jennings took Mullin from the game and sent Killian in to finish it out. Edward proved as much an enigma to the budding Browns as was his predecessor, and the visitors added one hit, no tally, to their totals during the remainder of the game.

LONG ON TALK, IS JOHNSON

Extracts from the statements of J. Johnson, supreme blower of the heavyweight class:

REPORT.
"I will whip Kaufmann inside of nine rounds. If I do not knock him out I will not ask Coffroth to pay my training expenses, and I am not throwing away \$500 at this stage of the game."

AFTER—
"I played it safe all the way." Here we have the keynote to Johnson's character as a fighter. Before he gets into the ring he can talk about knocking a man out, but when the bell rings Johnson begins to play it safe. The bird can sing when he has to, but he doesn't like music.

In his pork-and-beans days we used to say that Johnson was a safe betting proposition. He could always win on points because he was always playing safe. Gifted with every natural qualification, born with a physical which should have made him a champion among champions, Johnson had everything in the world save a heart of a fighter. He is a champion who would rather block a light punch than give a heavy one, and he will never cut loose that right hand unless he knows that the return is smothered in advance.

Ketchell Has a Good Chance.

The Kaufmann fight will help to make Ketchell a drawing card against the champion, always providing that Murphy hurdles the Boston stumbling block. If a scored middleweight like Tommy Burns, with nothing but a two-step and a right swing, could put Johnson on the defensive for twelve rounds, Ketchell should have a chance, when he could stay six rounds with a fighter of Ketchell's calibre.

Burns knew he was whipped before he set foot in the ring, but the Canuck at least had a fighter's heart, tucked away in his best until he and the pictures show the rather remarkable spectacle of a little footed forcing the pace against a fat-footed black giant, who might have ended the

DOPE ON O.R.F.U.

The O. R. F. U. announcement that a compact senior series has been formed among Ontario clubs will do a great deal towards promoting the game in this province.

The Big Four has had almost a monopoly on gate receipts for the past two years, which does not tend to encourage the sport, owing to the heavy expenses entailed in running a club.

However, even the clubs in the interprovincial have not been successful financially as might be expected, and there is no doubt the coming winter will see a big shakeup among the senior clubs.

The Hamilton Tigers have made money, but the other three teams last year dropped a wad.

The chances are strongly in favor of an eastern and western senior series being formed, and in this event that would be far and away the strongest, and could make the other clubs come to them.
