TORONTO, Feb. 14.—The local grain market is firm this morning at prices showing a very slight advance over last night's close.

CHICAGO, Feb. 13.—Wheat today suffered the most severe decline in over two months. Bearish sentiment became pronounced owing to continued big receipts and to lower cables in consequence the close was 1 1/2c to 1 3/4c under Saturday night's level. Corn 3/4c to 1c and oats 1/2c off.

Stop loss orders made the break in wheat much worse than might otherwise have been the case. Receipts in all directions had furnished a genuine surprise, running about double what they were a year ago. World shipments, too, turned out to be larger

than expected and the decrease in the United States visible supply was disappointingly small. Back of the weakness in foreign markets lay the fact that Argentine exports showed signs of material gain. There was also a report that Indian promised a bumper yield. Besides the cash demand here and the flour trade at Minneapolis were both slow. A fair demand from commission houses developed on the decline, but the buying served only to give business a steady tone at the close, especially as plenty of moisture southeast seemed to make more and more suspicious the outlook for winter wheat.

Corn values weakened chiefly because of the collapse in wheat. Favorable weather and the generous arrivals acted likewise against the bulls. Notwithstanding a steady trade oats suffered a setback as a result of bearish feeling in the other grain pits. Support, however, developed after the dip.

Total clearances of wheat and flour were equal to 321,000 bushels. Primary receipts were 1,518,000 bushels, compared with 823,000 bushels the corresponding day a year ago. The visible supply of wheat in the United States decreased 609,000 bushels. The amount of breadstuff on ocean passage increased 1,688,000 bushels. Estimated receipts for tomorrow: Wheat, 72 cars; corn, 1,021 cars; oats, 239 cars.

CHURCHILL AND HALDANE CLOSETED WITH KING

The War Minister Delivers Personal Message From the German Kaiser.

London, Feb. 13.—Fresh from his visit to Germany, where he was received in a lengthy personal audience by Emperor William, War Minister Haldane went to Buckingham Palace today to see King George. It was reported that he carried a personal message from the Kaiser to the King.

Previous to his conference with Lord Haldane, the King presided at a meeting of the privy council at Buckingham Palace and discussed with the members of the council the speech from the throne, which is to be read tomorrow when Parliament is opened. The King also had a long conference today with Winston Churchill, first lord of the admiralty, who recently addressed the home rule meeting at Belfast and the next day made a speech in Glasgow, declaring that Great Britain must continue to maintain her naval supremacy.

Mr. Churchill also outlined to the King the recent changes effected by the admiralty in the reorganization of the navy.

ASK MILLION TO IMPROVE ROADS

Important Change In the Ontario Road Act Appears In the New Bill.

JUDGES TOO NUMEROUS

Leader Rowell Introduces Measure to Make Important Amendments to Judicature Act.

Toronto, Feb. 14.—The Ontario Government will ask the Legislature to approve of a further appropriation of one million dollars to assist in the construction of county roads. Provision for the appropriation is made in an amendment to the highways act introduced in the House by Hon. Dr. Reaume, Minister of Public Works, yesterday.

The million dollars will supplement that voted by the Legislature in 1901 when the Ross Government introduced the act to aid in the improvement of public highways. Of the amount set aside then, \$893,814 has been paid out to the counties entitled to receive grants under the good roads scheme, and the balance will be more than taken up when the call upon last year's road expenditure are made by the county authorities.

To Centralize Management.
The bill brought before the House by Hon. Dr. Reaume yesterday makes no change in the act as amended in 1907, while the counties were entitled to receive from the Government one-third of the total amount expended upon a county roads system. A new clause provides that the maintenance of all roads shall be under the highway improvement act is to be centralized in a capable county roads superintendent or engineer, appointed and acting under the direction of the county council. A foreman or inspector is to be placed in charge of any work when the superintendent cannot personally oversee, but no member of the county council shall be employed. The regulations of the department have taken this form for some time, but there was no means of making it compulsory upon the county authorities.

The Government secures a greater control over the county road system by an amendment which provides that when, according to the present act, the county council may return the roads to the control of the township, no change may be made except with the approval of the Government. Along similar lines is a section giving the Minister of Public Works power to change any county road plans, and to strike out any road because of altered conditions should not be constructed and maintained as a county road.

The amending act also provides that the clerk of every county shall, before the first day of February each year, publish a detailed statement of all expenditures in connection with county roads or bridges in the preceding calendar year, and in such form as the minister may direct. This is intended to acquaint the people of the counties with the exact extent of the work done.

Many Judges.
Mr. N. W. Rowell introduced his bill to amend the judicature act by striking out the appointment of two additional high court judges. The positions were never filled; the former minister of justice, Sir Allen Aylesworth, declining to make the appointment of the ground that additional judges would be an unnecessary burden upon the Province.

A number of masters of titles in the district of Kenora will receive a Saturday half-holiday if Captain Macdonald survives. Under the land titles act the masters have a holiday, but under the registry act they have to work. Since the one man occupies office under both acts he gets a holiday and works at the same time.

Hon. J. J. Foy introduced a bill to amend the county judges act by providing for the appointment of a junior judge for Lincoln County.

Hon. Dr. Reaume introduced a statute revision bill respecting the banks and banks of streams and waterways. It contains only minor changes.

YOUNG FARMER WAS INSTANTLY KILLED

Chester Bogue, of Lambeth, Struck On Head By Falling Tree.

Lambeth, Feb. 13.—While felling a tree on his father's farm, a half mile north of this place, Chester Bogue, son of David Bogue, and one of the most promising young men of this village, was instantly killed by the tree falling upon him. The accident happened about four o'clock this afternoon.

Chester Bogue, his father and the hired man had gone into the woods to cut down some trees. While felling one, young Bogue misjudged the position in which the tree was going to fall, and it toppled over nearly on top of him. He made an effort to get from under it, but a large limb struck him on the top of the head, and he was killed instantly.

His father and the hired man ran to the village for a doctor, but when medical aid was brought it was found that death had been instantaneous. Coroner Routledge viewed the remains and decided that an inquest was unnecessary.

Chester Bogue was about 30 years of age, and he leaves a wife and two small children. He comes from one of the best-known families in this district, and his death came as a shock to the entire neighborhood. Besides his parents he is also survived by one brother and one sister, both of Lambeth.

ELGIN FRUIT TREES RUINED BY FROST

Hundreds Are Reported Badly Damaged in Vicinity of St. Thomas.

St. Thomas, Ont., Feb. 13.—Fruit growers in this section say frost has practically ruined the fruit crop in this section. Many apple trees are badly split by frost and girdled by mice. Raspberries and thimbleberries are destroyed and the peach crop is doomed.

THURST CRYING BABE INTO THE STOVE

Winnipeg Woman Believed To Be Insane Confesses Terrible Crime to the Police.

Winnipeg, Feb. 13.—"I put the baby in the stove and burned it. I'm sorry now, but I did it when the feeling came over me."

These were the words of Ada McCarron, the wife of James McCarron, of this city, in confessing to the police this afternoon that she put her five-weeks-old child in the hot blast stove in her house and burned it alive. She said she did this nine days ago and then spread the story that the child had been kidnapped from the cradle.

Mrs. McCarron is locked up on a charge of murder. Since the disappearance of the child, Detectives Hamahan and Kennedy have been working on the case. They early became convinced that the child had been burned alive. The woman was arrested this afternoon on suspicion and an hour or two afterwards confessed. When the police visited the woman's home in the north end the day the child disappeared they examined the hot blast stove from which the ashes had been removed. It was then cold, but that was four hours afterwards. The search was search and little bones were found there, whether human or not remained to be proven.

When the husband came home at noon the woman was rocking the cradle, which now, according to her confession, had been empty for an hour. The only theory of the police as to motive, is that she was mentally deranged when she thrust her crying baby into the fire.

LADY NORTHCLEIFFE ILL.
London, Feb. 13.—Lady Northcliffe was operated upon by Sir Frederick Treves last Friday. She is recovering, her conditions being declared to be favorable.

Lady Northcliffe was Miss Mary Elizabeth Milner, and was married in 1888 to Alfred Harnsworth, now proprietor of the Times, the Daily Mail and many other papers and magazines.

VICTORIA CROSS SAILOR SUMMONED BY DEATH

Sir Nowell Salmon, Admiral of the Fleet, Dead In His 77th Year.

London, Feb. 14.—Admiral of the Fleet Sir Nowell Salmon died today at the age of 77. Until his retirement in 1905, after serving 58 years in the navy, he was one of the most popular officers in the fleet. He was one of the rare possessors of the Victoria Cross, which he won for bravery in the field during the Indian Mutiny.

The courageous act for which Sir Nowell Salmon was awarded the Victoria Cross, was done during the second relief of Lucknow in 1857. He was attached as lieutenant to the naval brigade, and while the sailors were attacking a strongly-occupied fort, they suffered from the extraordinary marksmanship of one of the rebels. Salmon volunteered to climb a tree which exposed him to almost certain death in order to pick off the Indian marksmen. His field glass was shattered in his hand by the sharpshooters, but Salmon took aim and shot the Sepoy dead.
