ANTI-UNION PRESBYTERIANS PREPARING A STATEMENT

Believe Organic Union Would Do Irreparable Damage to Church.

Toronto, Sept. 11.—The following statement regarding the anti-union movement in the Presbyterian Church was sent to the press:

"In June last when the Presbyterian General Assembly, by a majority vote resolved to press forward organic union as speedily as possible, despite the fact that only thirty-seven per cent of the members had voted for it, a meeting was held in Toronto by those who were present at the assembly and congress who were resolved to stand for the defence and continuance of the Presbyterian Church in Canada.

"The meeting was very representative of the church throughout Canada, and, after earnest conference, committees were appointed to issue a statement for the people and to go on with organization throughout the Dominion. These committees met in Toronto on Thursday and Friday last from different parts.

"The chair was occupied by Rev. A. G. MacBeth, and Dr. Wardlaw Taylor, of Toronto, was secretary. The first business was the preparation of the statement, for which many suggestions had been received in the meantime, and as a basis for which several drafts had been prepared by different members. All these were carefully considered, and a document worthy of the importance of the case was settled upon unanimously. This document will be issued through the

The jumping of the hunters before the grandstand made a hit with the crowd. Some pretty exhibitions of "fencing" by green hunters were pulled off yesterday.

It wasn't "Kids' Day" yesterday, but the small fry were very much in evidence. They always are at Fair time. Dodging around in the Main Building in their quest for souvenirs and samples, hiking in and out of the Midway shows, and dodging into unoccupied spaces in the grandstand, they were very much at home. Like a circus, the Fair is a real "small boy's" institution. The old folks enjoy them both, but it takes the vivacity of youth to get the full enjoyment out of either.

Some very pretty staging is utilized in the second and third scenes, and the costumes, being of early 18th century vintage, were quaint and picturesque.

The production should draw good crowds again on the remaining nights of the week.
