

18TH SOLDIERS' CHURCH PARADE

1,000 Strong, They March To Dundas Centre Methodist Church.

BIG BATTLE WITH SELF

Hanley Tells Soldiers That All Fights Are Not In Trenches.

Over 1,000 members of the Eighteenth Battalion and several hundred civilians attended divine service at the Dundas Centre Methodist Church Sunday morning from 10 to 11 o'clock. The pulpit was draped with a Union Jack while the order of service followed was the one prescribed by the militia department.

Marched to Church.
The men from the barracks joined the civilians and marched to the church headed by the First Hussars Band under the direction of Rossell Fowkes. There was a large crowd of citizens outside the church and along Dundas street and many were the favorable comments made by the citizens on the soldierly appearance of the men.

The feature of the service was the singing of the soldiers. The volume of sound that filled the large edifice was a revelation to the civilians present, and as Joe Hanley, men's campaign speaker, declared in his address later, an inspiration to all that were present. All the men joined in the responsive readings and the prayers. Rev. A. J. Thomas, pastor of the church, gave the soldier boys a hearty welcome and invited them to come often to Dundas Centre Church, Mrs. (Dr.) H. A. Kingsmill sang "The Holy City."

"Voice of the masses."
Joe Hanley addressed the soldiers on "The Divinity of Man, taking as his text, "Ye Are of God." "Kings and governments may rule, but the voice of the masses will be heard in the next five years. There will be a new and better civilization arise at the end of the war, and you and I must have a hand in it," he said.

"It is not the man who goes into battle and exposes himself needlessly that is the hero," continued Mr. Hanley. "It is the man that goes into the fray with fear in his heart, yet pushes himself to the front. He is the man that deserves the credit. God has given us a wonderful job, the clearing of the world from sin, sorrow and shame. A man is not a good soldier until he first masters himself from the forces of evil and burning within. There is no doubt that the biggest job in this world is just living. The big men of the war now in progress will be the ones who give every ounce of their living."

Not the Man.
"God needs you in this battle of life. The man who staggers around the streets in a drunken stupor is not the man he wants. When you get to the front you will find your souls tried, as they were never tried before. The biggest battles are not fought on the battlefield, but in the lonely room against your worst enemy, yourself. God will reward you for the victory. He has made a wonderful provision for us when he said that we were His children and that he had adopted us into his family.

ASKS PROSECUTION OF LONDON DOCTORS

Township Health Official After Scalps of City Medical Men.

Wholesale prosecutions of city doctors on charges of failure to report to the London Township board of health cases of smallpox to which they have been called are likely to be instituted as the result of an investigation which Dr. D. G. MacNeill, of Arva, the township medical health officer, will ask the board to request the Provincial board to make.

Dr. MacNeill will confer with the reeve and clerk of the township today with a view of having a special meeting of the board called to take up the matter, when he will recommend that the Provincial board be asked to conduct a rigid investigation and that the offending physicians be prosecuted in the courts.

Although several London doctors have been called in, Dr. MacNeill declares, the first doctor to report a case was Dr. Edwin Seaborn, who on Saturday gave notice that a case had developed near the Hydro-Electric station.

COLONIES' HELP WANTED KAISER

Upset War Lord's Plans By Their Loyal Co-operation, Says Hanley.

A STRENUOUS CAMPAIGN

Speaker Has Three Heavy Mass Meetings On Sunday.

Yesterday was the most strenuous day yet for Joe Hanley, campaign speaker in the men's campaign for peace, which will continue in London for another week. Hanley spoke in the morning at the Dundas Centre Methodist Church to the soldiers of the Eighteenth Battalion; in the afternoon he talked to over 1,500 men in the Majestic Theatre. In the evening Hanley delivered his address, "Pilate Before Christ," to a mixed audience of nearly 2,000 in the Majestic.

Displays Union Jack.
Mayor C. M. R. Graham was introduced to Hanley at the afternoon address, occupied a seat on the platform at both gatherings. The afternoon address was brought to a patriotic close, when Hanley had a large Union Jack brought onto the platform, to the cheers of the audience.

"There is only one thing that is bigger than it is, and that is the banner of Jesus Christ," Hanley declared. "For 155 years England has been preaching respect to the flag and to God, wherever the British flag waved. When they figured on being the present conflict went across the seas, England listened for its result in her colonies. The answering sound came from every loyal dominion, striking terror into the heart of the foe."

Left Out Loyalty.
"Germany was seventeen miles from Paris once, and that is the nearest she will ever get. She was in Ostend, but she was not in London. When they figured on being on Paris in two weeks, then St. Petersburg, then London, and then India, and Australia, and Canada. Within a year, the devil will remove him from the earth. I am trying to remain neutral, but it's hard," Hanley declared.

Vote Out Saloon.
In both addresses Hanley mentioned the liquor traffic, and said that if the question were put to the people he hoped they would vote out the saloon. "The only way to get rid of the saloon entirely is to quit making booze. You can start to keep your citizens sober by teaching your children to keep sober, and you can do this by keeping liquor out of your homes," he said. "You say you wish you could control the saloons. Bless you, if the church people in this city would get together, you could do anything. Don't knock so much among ourselves. Get the big guns out and shell the enemy," he advised.

"We church people make a great mistake when we don't do everything possible for our boys and girls. Make the home a pleasant place for them. Do away with the old-time parlor, where the kids are never allowed, except on Christmas or when there is company. The worst kind of Christianity is the kind that keeps boys from going wrong, instead of bringing him back after." Hanley said in the afternoon, speaking on the subject, "A Losing Game."

Devil Always Wins.
"The devil always wins the game, where your soul is the stake, if you play the game without Christ, because everybody has a weak spot somewhere, and the devil will pick it out because we use such weak weapons," Hanley said in part. "The devil wins because he doesn't care what he pays for a human soul. You can't win in the game unless you realize that Christ is worth while, but you have to get prepared for a fight."

After Hanley's address in the afternoon, 55 men, many of them soldiers, walked down and shook the speaker's hand, in declaration that they would live better lives from now on.

Pilate's Failure.
"Pilate Before Christ" was Hanley's evening subject. "Pilate failed in the critical time, when he lost the great opportunity, because he was the proponent of self-indulgence, and self-indulgence always conquers. He had never denied himself a single thing. He was a spoiled boy, and when he had to stem his inclinations, as a result of his bringing up, he had not the power. One of the weakest spots in our modern civilization, is that we are bringing up children in a weak kind of a way," Hanley said.

"On the judgment day, you will face the sins in eternity you committed on earth, and you must be ready for that test. That's where Pilate failed."

Religious Hypocrites.
"Many men say that they would like to be Christians, but that there are so many hypocrites in the church. That's right. The smallest man on earth is a religious hypocrite, except for the man who hides behind one. A church is not a museum, where the congregation picks out their likes and dislikes in the congregation, as sightseers do in a museum. A church is a spiritual hospital. It has a lot of spiritual sick people in it. The more there are, the more it shows that the church is doing a good work, in attending to them."

If I had a hypocrite in my church, I'd give him a spiritual anesthetic, take him into the operating-room, and cut out his hypocrisy," Hanley stated. He said that his proudest possession was a petition, signed by the congregation of a church, of which he was pastor, asking the bishopric to remove him because he failed the church every Sunday with ruff-raff, so that the regular congregation couldn't find room.

"I do you to find an excuse for Pilate condemning Christ, and I defy you for an excuse to condemn Him," Hanley said in conclusion.

"Instead of the parable contained in these four verses, being called the parable of the seed growing secretly, it will be called the parable of the harvest coming gradually.
