

DECLARES 'BREMENS' CAUGHT IN NETS IN DOVER STRAITS

Took Two Days to Get Crew of Sub Free.

FIVE TAKEN OUT DEAD

Both German Boats Were Captured, According to New York Story.

NEW YORK, Oct. 18.—The New York World this morning says: "The English sources of information, which have always proved to be reliable, the World has received the following report:

"The first Bremen was captured in the Straits of Dover, she was following the tactics of the Deutschland in steaming along under the wake of an English vessel to escape detection. She had been spotted further out and the net prepared to snare her. She completely was so entangled that it required two days to get out the crew, of which five were dead and the remainder in the last stages of exhaustion.

The most important part of the capture was the package of valuable documents and mail matter, which was captured by British forces. She was taken to Chatham, but where she now is was not stated.

The British also captured the second Bremen, but no details are given. No attempt was made to capture the Deutschland on returning, as it was not considered worth while to risk the boats to do so.

A third Bremen is on her way, and sailed, expecting to dock in New London. She may be expected at any moment, as she has not been captured. It is when it was found she had not arrived, rushed out to sea to find and aid her. Her mission was to look up the Bremen. The Deutschland is coming out in November.

GERMANS SUSTAIN HEAVY LOSSES IN ATTACKS ON FRENCH

Attempts Made to Regain Ground Near Belloy.

PARIS, via London, Oct. 17.—The French war office communication issued this evening says: "On the whole Somme front there was a bombardment by both sides today which sometimes reached great violence. East of Belloy-on-Santerre the enemy launched two fresh attacks which, like the preceding ones, were completely repulsed. The enemy suffered heavy losses. There is nothing to report on the remainder of the front. German aeroplanes dropped several bombs on Amiens, but without doing any military damage."

C. P. R. OFFICIALS IN CONFERENCE WITH MEN

Vice-President Said To Be Inclined to Reconsider Decision.

WINNIPEG, Oct. 17.—After hearing the declaration from S. N. Berry, vice-president of the Order of Railway Conductors, that 94 per cent of the conductors and 98 per cent of the trainmen on the Canadian Pacific Railway had decided for a strike, Grant Hall, vice-president of the company, at this afternoon's conference proceeded to take up the matters at issue with the leaders in a very thorough manner.

Each of the demands which the men make upon the company was discussed at length, and after a session lasting nearly two hours, the session was adjourned until tomorrow morning, when it will be resumed at 11 o'clock. While the men were adamant in their demands, Mr. Hall is said by the men to have been sympathetic and inclined to reconsider several of his decisions which he previously passed, and was led up to the issuance of the strike ballots.

25,000,000 of German People Suffer For Food

Those Without Money or Influence Do Not Get Sufficient Supply.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 17.—How the scarcity of food in Germany and the Government direction of food distribution are working out, is described by a prominent man who recently returned from there.

He said the burden is falling on about 25,000,000 of the German people. The soldiers at the front, the munition factory workers, people with means, and persons on farms are getting enough to eat. About 25,000,000 of the poor class, without money or influence, are the sufferers. They are getting an average food supply, which, measured in calories, is below normal. It is found practically impossible to keep persons who raise food products—that is the agricultural part of the population—on a preferred food supply. Much of the wheat in Germany is among the 25,000,000 who are getting scant food supplies.

PRESBYTERIANS WHO OPPOSE UNION ARE MEETING IN TORONTO

Dr. Robertson of Toronto Is Elected President.

STRONG WORDS UTTERED

Dr. Campbell Warns Against "Designing Men" and "Backstairs Influence."

TORONTO, Oct. 17.—Between three and four hundred delegates from all over Canada, representing those of the Presbyterian Church in Canada who oppose union with the Methodists and Congregationalists met today at St. Andrew's Church to commence a three-day convention. Rev. Dr. Andrew Robertson, St. James Square, Toronto, was elected president of the convention with Rev. J. D. Cunningham, Welland, as secretary.

Rev. Dr. McLeod of Barrie, in his sermon, repeated the contention which is the background of the convention movement, that the church should not be forced to consent to union with the proposed union until and unless it were accepted with practical unanimity.

Rev. Dr. Campbell of Montreal, in the course of an address said: "The constitution of the church has been violated by the majority of the last general assembly, is our last line of defence, and it is impregnable. Let our church beware in time, and see that it become not a tool in the hands of designing men; supported by the backstairs influence of certain chambers that need not be located."

At the evening session the statement was made by both the chairman and Rev. J. R. M. Glassford, after a request for names and addresses of those present, that it was impossible to get them from the churches, which they said "are closed to us." In one case it was known that 45 persons in a congregation had voted against union, but when an effort was made to get their names only five could be located.

Two papers dealing with the constitution and the policy of the church were read, one prepared by Hon. J. C. Brown of New Westminster and the other by Rev. W. G. Hanna of Cookville.

LIBERAL CANDIDATE IS POPULAR IN SOUTH GREY

W. H. Wright Has Won Brilliant Reputation as a Lawyer.

OWEN SOUND, Oct. 17.—The nomination yesterday at Durham of W. H. Wright of the law firm of Wright & Telford, Owen Sound, to be the Liberal candidate for Southeast Grey in the next Dominion election, was a surprise to Owen Sounders. Mr. Wright has been a prominent worker in Liberal politics here, and was recently elected president of the new North Grey Liberal Association in Meaford, but he was not known to be a candidate for other honors.

Ex-levee Calder of Durham, the only other nominee of the convention, who received a relatively small vote, on the nomination of a look-alike upon as the most likely candidate. Mr. Wright will succeed the late H. H. Miller, and no doubt will be a popular candidate, his native town being Flesherton. He has a considerable practice in the south part of the county.

He has made quite a reputation for himself in the last few years as a criminal lawyer, and is a speaker of exceptional merit. No map is better known through the western part of the province, not only in his profession but as a sportsman, and particularly in bowling and curling circles. He came to Owen Sound about twelve years ago as the representative of the firm of Lucas, Wright & McCardle, and for some time later was associated with Hon. I. B. Lucas alone.

About four years ago when Hon. A. G. MacKay removed to Edmonton he became the senior partner in the firm of Wright, Telford & McDonald, with which he has been associated ever since, the firm having one of the most extensive practices in Owen Sound.

ANGLICAN CONFERENCE OPENS AT MONTREAL

Archdeacon Cody and the Primate to Speak at Banquet Thursday.

MONTREAL, Oct. 17.—The Bishops of Fredericton, Quebec, Ottawa, Kingston, Toronto, Niagara Falls, Edmonton, Calgary, Qu'Appelle and Athabasca, also two clerical and two lay delegates from nearly every diocese of the Dominion, are in this city in attendance at a conference for the consideration of important questions of administration, education, and missionary progress affecting the Church of England in Canada. The big occasion of the week will be on Thursday, when Ven. Archdeacon Cody of Toronto, and the primate, His Grace the Archbishop of Rupert's Land, will address the gathering at the banquet at the Windsor Hotel, to be given by the Montreal churchmen to the visitors.

TEUTONS FAIL TO SHAKE THE LINES OF THE RUMANIANS

Berlin and Vienna Admit They Are Holding Frontier.

BUCHAREST RECORDS GAIN

Von Falkenhayn Is Driven Back in the Uzul Valley.

BERLIN, Oct. 17.—via London.—Rumanian troops in Transylvania are making a stand in the frontier passes against the Teutonic armies, German army headquarters announced today. No notable change in the situation is reported in the statement, which is as follows:

"The Rumanians are offering resistance on the roads through the passes on the eastern front (Transylvania). South and west of Kronstadt the position generally is unchanged."

VIENNA, Oct. 7.—via London.—The Austrian official communication issued today says: "In the frontier district, south of Hermannstadt (Transylvania) the situation is unchanged. In the Gyergo mountains the Rumanian resistance continues."

SAYS WILSON AGREES WITH GERMANY'S VIEWS

NEW YORK, Oct. 18.—The New York Sun this morning gives unusual prominence to a Washington story under the headline, "Wilson calls actual Lusitania attack justifiable, and accepts Germany's refusal to disavow sinking."

The Sun quotes a "source close to the state department," as authority for the statement that President Wilson has accepted the view that "the sinking of the Lusitania was justifiable," and had capitulated, presumably in the interests of German-American amity, on the proposition advanced by the American Government that, "while the sinking of the Lusitania was justified, the taking of American life was not justified."

"The terms of the Lusitania settlement may formally be announced any day by Secretary Lansing."

The Sun concludes: "German official circles, it is explained, regard the Lusitania case as definitely disposed of."

TO PRAY FOR NATION, NOT FOR PRESIDENT

ST. LOUIS, Oct. 17.—The house of deputies of the general convention of the Protestant Episcopal Church today voted to eliminate the special prayers for the president from the morning and evening prayer services, and to substitute for them a prayer for the safety and preservation of the nation. The same prayer will be used in both services.

COMPULSORY REGISTRATION FOR NO. 10 DISTRICT

WINNIPEG, Oct. 17.—A compulsory registration is to be taken in Military District No. 10, to determine just what man-power is available for military service, and carry on essential industries, according to E. R. Chapman, recruiting director for Military District No. 10, who returned today from Ottawa. Mr. Chapman declared that an order-in-council would be passed without delay, giving the necessary authority to take this registration.

INVESTIGATION OF COST OF NEWSPRINT

Publishers and Manufacturers Cannot Agree On Price.

OTTAWA, Oct. 17.—In a conference of newspaper publishers and newsprint paper manufacturers held here today the manufacturers adhered to the price of 3 cents a pound that was quoted as a minimum in the conference last week before the minister of finance. The conference today was presided over by R. W. Broadner, of the department of finance.

As the publishers and the paper manufacturers were unable to reach an agreement, the request of the former for an investigation by the Government stands, and it is likely an inquiry will be made by the department of finance.

NEW YORK OFFICIAL ALLEGED ACCOMPLICE

Accused of Instigating Murder of an Italian.

NEW YORK, Oct. 17.—Gaetano Montemagno, who shot and killed Michael Gaimari on March 8, 1914, testifying today at the trial here of Michael Rofrano, a lawyer, accused of complicity in the crime, declared Rofrano not only was the instigator of the murder, but had warned him that unless he killed Gaimari he would "die the way we want you to die." Rofrano at the time was deputy street cleaning commissioner of New York.

SWISS ORDER FORBIDS EXPORT TO ALLIES

Fifty Thousand Men Rendered Idle as a Result.

GENEVA, via Paris, Oct. 17.—The Swiss Government, in consequence of the recent economic arrangement with Germany, has prohibited Swiss factories to export ammunition to the Entente Allies if they are using German coal or steel. This order will render idle over 50,000 men, among whom there is much dissatisfaction.

The proprietors of the factories met today and protested against the order, arguing that Switzerland receives Belgian and not German coal, and that the Entente Allies supply raw material for their ammunition.

DORCHESTER MAN OFFERS FREE SITE FOR INDUSTRY

Wm. Dale Wants to See His Village Grow.

[Special to The Advertiser.] DORCHESTER, Oct. 17.—Wm. Dale has offered a free site to any good manufacturer who will locate in this village. The land which he purposes to give joins the railroad and has a spring creek in it.

A sidewalk is being laid as far as the schoolhouse. The council is providing one-third of the cost, while the remainder is being defrayed by subscription. This will be a great improvement.

Mrs. Robert Sutherland has sold her farm just outside the eastern village limits to Mr. Calvert of Dorchester. The anniversary services of the Methodist Church will be held Sunday, October 29. Rev. Mr. Houston of London will have charge of the services. Mr. Rivers of Leithbridge, Alta., is visiting his brother, Rev. Mr. Rivers, of Dorchester. He preached Sunday evening, a sermon which was much enjoyed by the audience.

ANOTHER NORWEGIAN BOAT.

LONDON, Oct. 17.—Lloyds announces that the Norwegian steamer Konge Al is reported to have been sunk on Saturday. The steamer, of 801 gross tons, was owned in Kristiania.

GREEKS ATTACK FRENCH SAILORS; HISS ADMIRAL

LONDON, Oct. 17.—A dispatch to Reuters' Telegram Company from Athens says:

"The situation appears to be dangerous. There have been Royalist demonstrations in the streets. Admiral De Fournet, commander of the Entente fleet in the Mediterranean, was hissed and a detachment of French sailors was driven back by a hostile crowd."

"A procession of some 4,000 malcontents headed by the Greek and American flags, stopped outside the American legation, protested against the landing of foreign marines and demanded the protection of the American minister, who was absent."

"The demonstrators then paraded the streets, singing the Greek National Anthem."

TOBACCO SHIPMENTS HELD UP.

LONDON, Oct. 17.—Large consignments of tobacco from the United States for Dutch and Scandinavian ports, are being held here on the claim of the Government that they fail to comply with the recent arrangements under which cargoes paid for before August 1 and shipped previous to August 30 might proceed to neutral destinations.

RUSSIAN ATTACKS WITH BAYONET ARE WORRYING ENEMY

Many Trenches Captured by Hand-to-Hand Fighting.

GERMANS SHOW EFFECTS

Keep Up Panicky Bursts of Gunfire Without Achieving Results.

LONDON, Oct. 17.—"On both the northern and southwestern fronts of Russia," says Reuters' Petrograd correspondent, "heavy rains and fogs are impeding the operations, but the Russians are not giving the enemy a moment's rest. Many trenches have been captured by hand grenade and bayonet attacks in the dark."

"The nervousness of the Germans at this style of fighting has been expressed in panicky bursts of resultless gunfire. The Russian attacks on the new German positions of Syni-Usky-Korytnia, southeast of Vladimir-Volynski, resulted in the capture of first line trenches on a wide front,

despite the defence by the Germans of some of their best regiments. Reinforcements were brought up from neighboring sectors. "Counter-attacks, accompanied by curtains of fire, were delivered by the Germans, isolating the Russian trenches. In the fifth attack the Germans at some points reached the breastworks and threatened to break the Russian line. The Russian bayonets, however, were too deadly, and the Germans renounced their attempts at the recapture of their old positions. "At Kiriobaba in the Carpathians, the Russian infantry also has been scoring heavily in hand-to-hand fighting. With a view to interposing a barrier to the Russo-Rumanian forces the Austro-Hungarians began an attack in considerable forces Saturday. They breached the Russian entanglements and their massed gun fire destroyed part of the Russian defences before they launched their infantry attack. Under cover of the woods they reached some portions of the Russian trenches, but after a sharp struggle they yielded before the Russian bayonets."

TO PROMOTE SHEEP BREEDING.

TORONTO, Oct. 17.—In order to promote sheep breeding in Ontario the department of agriculture will give to a boy in each of five counties as yet undetermined, who passes the best examination in sheep judging, and has taken a short course, six ewes. By the end of four years he must return to the department six shearing ewes, two each year, after the first two years.

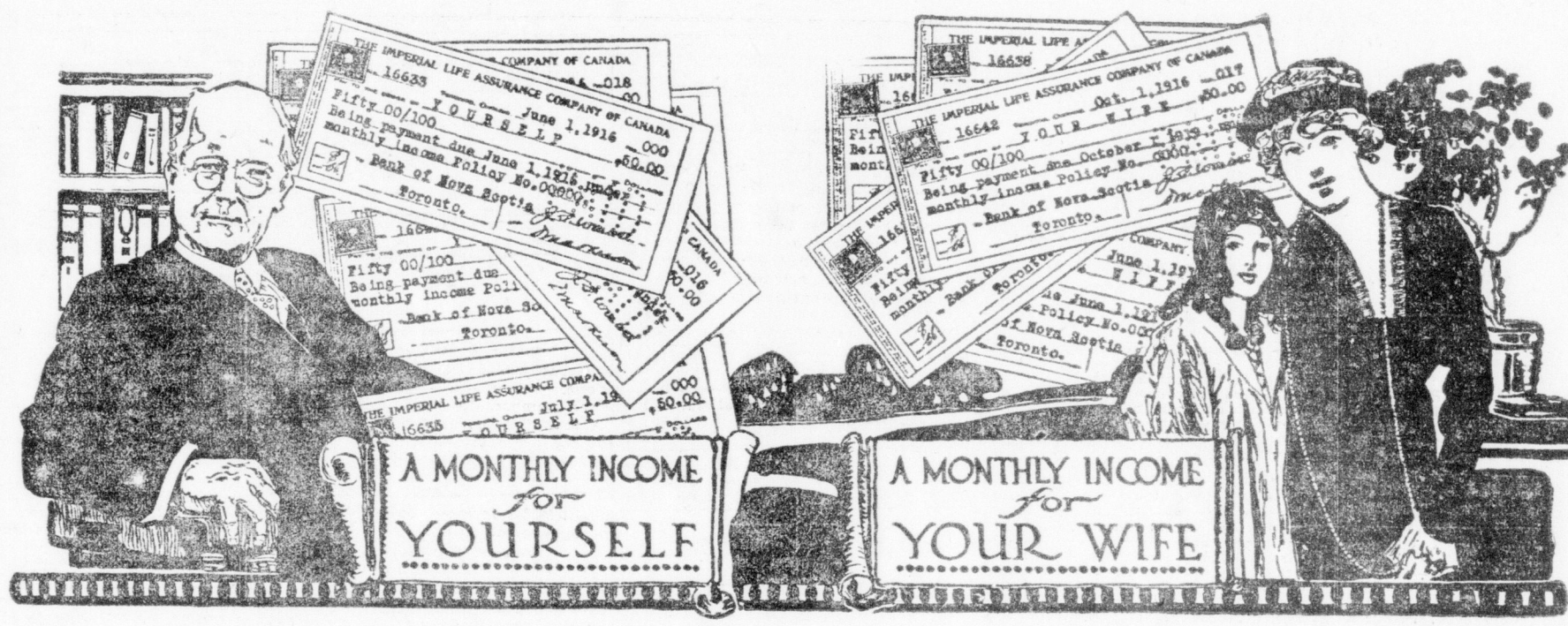
ENEMY'S PROGRESS AT ONE POINT ONLY OF RUMANIAN FRONT

LONDON, Oct. 17.—According to news received in London during the last twenty-four hours the Austro-Germans have made progress at only one point on the Rumanian front, but that point is one of importance. On the Rumanian side of the Gyimes pass, which leads from Northeastern Transylvania in to Northern Rumania and is traversed by the railway, the Germans have reached Agas, ten miles within the Rumanian frontier.

In the other passes the situation is virtually unchanged. Meanwhile the Russians have been heavily engaged, in many places attacking fiercely with the object of preventing the withdrawal of any of the Austro-German troops for action against Rumania. On the Macedonian front, it is announced that a grand attack began last Saturday.
