JURY EXONERATES L. S. R. EMPLOYEES

No Blame Attached To Crew of Car That Killed Price.

No blame was attached to the employees of the London Street Railway Company for the death of John Price, 928 Waterloo street, who, the jury at the inquest at the police station last night decided, came to his death on Saturday by being struck by a street car. The inquest was one of the shortest ever recorded here, the whole time being 30 minutes.

Eight witnesses, namely, Constable Roy Venner, Constable Agmon Barryman, Russell Boyd, Ernest Heard, James O'Neill, William A. Klassen, William Trotter and Colin David, gave corroborative evidence to the effect that the street car which struck Price, who was 71 years old, was proceeding north across the intersection of Dundas and Richmond streets, and Price was walking almost parallel to it, and stepped out in front of the fender, falling on it and then rolling underneath it. The majority of the witnesses heard the going ringing, the others not paying attention to this matter. It was agreed by all that the car was going slow, and that Constable Venner, who was on traffic duty, shouted a warning to Price.

Motorman William Hood, in charge of Normal car, No. 150, which struck the aged man, did not see the victim until the constable put up his hand to bring the car to a stop. He said that he kept the going ringing when crossing the intersection.

Dr. George Ramsay, who conducted the post-mortem, pronounced death due to hemorrhage and shock.

Coroner J. C. Wilson presided, and Crown Attorney J. B. McKillop conducted the examination of the witnesses.

BAKER SAYS LONDON MUST CLOSE SCHOOLS OR PAY FOR BOOTHS

Advocates School Holiday On Day of Municipal Elections.

Unless public and separate school children of this city are granted a holiday on Monday, December 5, the city of London will be compelled to rent polling booths for municipal elections in 78 houses throughout the city. This fact was disclosed by City Clerk S. B. Baker at a meeting of No. 1 committee of the city council Wednesday afternoon, when he asked for instructions on the matter.

Previous municipal elections have been held here on New Year's Day, when school is closed, but new arrangements have altered the date. The committee decided to confer with the chairman of the board of education, to ascertain if a holiday can be granted to the children on election day, in order that over \$500 may be saved, and central voting facilities provided for citizens.

Transferring Cost.
The consensus of opinion was that paying this money for rental of school rooms was merely a matter of transferring it from one civic department to another, and that no cost fell upon the ratepayers. City Clerk Baker was instructed to go ahead and prepare a year book and other printed matter in preparation for the municipal elections and previous nominations.

Asks for Letter Drops.
A communication from the deputy postmaster asking that a regulation providing for letter drops or letter slots in doors of residences, stores and offices be enacted. He suggested an opening 1 1/2 by 3 inches, readily accessible to letter carriers. It was referred to No. 2 committee. The auditor's report for the year was presented and taken as read.

Ald. J. C. Wilson asked if "The public utilities commission can override a bylaw passed by the council closing Victoria Park to vehicular traffic?"

"If they can we had better quit," replied Chairman Watkinson.

As the bylaw to this effect has not yet passed its third reading the committee decided to wait until such time as it has, before taking any action.

Out of Order.
Ald. Wenige moved that intersections of streets with Waterloo street north, which is paved, be paved at once, including those upon which street car tracks run, but this motion was ruled out of order, this being business for No. 2 committee to deal with.

Afraid of Street Railway.
"You are all afraid of the Street Railway Company," he commented. "I never saw such a bunch of pilfers."

The committee unanimously passed a resolution of condolence to the widow and family of the late ex-Alderman Wyatt, who served many terms on the city council and other civic bodies.

Ald. Cameron Wilson announced that

city patients in Victoria Hospital who are to be removed to the Home for Incurables would be in the latter institution this week, an agreement being drawn up whereby the Women's Christian Association reserves 24 beds in the home for city patients, at \$1.50 per diem in consideration of the \$50,000 grant voted by the citizens.

GLASS FORWARDS PETITION FOR P. O.

Member Strongly Recommends Postal Convenience For Manor Park Residents.

A petition, asking for a postoffice for Manor Park and signed by 158 names, has been forwarded with a recommendation by S. E. Glass, M.P., East Middlesex, to the postmaster-general. Highland and Manor Parks progressive club have sent through the petition, which the new office be established at Mr. J. Wright's house, No. 37 Wharfedale road, south, and Mr. Glass has likewise forwarded this with the petition to Mr. Blonidin.

Following is the text of the petition: Township of Westminster, Riding of East Middlesex, Manor Park, July, 1921.

To The Honorable P. E. Blonidin, K.C., M.P., Postmaster-General, Ottawa, Ont.

Dear Sir: Your petitioners, residents and owners in the Township of Westminster, humbly sheweth, that those of us living in the district known as Manor Park, in the said township, are seriously inconvenienced in not having postal conveniences.

That we cannot be satisfactorily served by rural mail delivery and humbly pray that you will cause to be established, a postoffice in our district, which will result in extending to our people the convenience of postal service which we are justly entitled to by reason of the fast-growing population, and the large number now living within this area. We request that the name of the new postoffice be Manor Park.

ONLY FOUR OUT OF SEVENTY IN ARREARS

Of the 70 or more people purchasing houses from the London Housing Commission four only are in arrears in their payments according to a report brought in by City Treasurer Bell at a meeting of the commission Wednesday afternoon. Action will be taken immediately against the four householders who are not paying as they should, if all other means fail the commission will take steps to evict them.

LONDON NOW DUMP FOR CHARITY CASES, CHARGES INSP. KELLY

C. A. S. Official Points Out Danger From Recent Order-in-Council.

That London is the "dumping ground" for charitable cases was the assertion of Inspector W. E. Kelly of the Children's Aid Society, at a meeting of No. 1 committee of the city council held Wednesday afternoon. Inspector Kelly was dealing with a Simcoe case and mentioned the fact that a recent order-in-council makes a municipality liable for charges who have resided there three months, instead of a year as heretofore.

"We have been dealing with the one year basis," he declared, "and if the three months' ruling goes into effect here London is going to be just as great a dumping ground. If it goes it will be a great danger here."

Ask McCullough.
"Write Mr. McCullough to that effect," commented Alderman J. C. Wilson.

"How long was Mr. McCullough here before he was dumped?" queried Ald. P. J. Watt. "Where did he come from?" The case was laid over until the next committee meeting.

Asks For Juvenile Court.
Ald. Harley moved that the council apply to whatever powers that be, for permission to inaugurate a juvenile court in London, with Police Magistrate A. H. M. Graydon in charge, on a basis of no costs, the Children's Aid Society and Soldiers' Aid Commission providing probation officers for the year.

Ald. J. C. Wilson—"You will be confronted with big salaries next year. Have you any figures to show the necessity of a juvenile court. The majority of cases are being charged on playing the sidewalk, or swimming without a bathing suit."

His Name In Court.
"That is a record against them in court," defended Ald. Harley. "My name is in police court," ventured Ald. Wilson.

"So is mine for letting my auto lights out," said Ald. Wenige.

"We could hold this court in the city hall on such days as are necessary," said Ald. Harley. "We should try it out and see if it is necessary. Are you willing to take a chance?"

"Once you commit yourself on this thing, it is for all time," warned Ald. Cameron Wilson. "Then your expense starts. The gratis officers will have to be replaced, and if Magistrate Graydon is not able to handle it you will have to pay someone a high salary. If there is as much juvenile crime in London as some people say, it is a reflection on the home life of the city. There has been only one serious case in months, and that was an incorrigible who should have been in a reformatory."

"I think Magistrate Graydon is hand-

ling this thing O. K. now," declared Ald. Wenige.

"I would like to see the juvenile figures for one year here, and the class of charges," commented Ald. Cameron Wilson, who moved to that effect. "Then it will be time to take action." His motion was carried and no further action was taken on the subject.

Vacate Storage Stalls.
The committee gave Ald. F. R. Watkinson power to notify those tenants of stalls in the market house, who use same for storage purposes, that they must vacate them for opposition trade. Ald. Harley declaring "opposition is the life of trade." Ald. Watkinson complained that one tenant paying \$7 per month asked the Western Fish Company \$200 for the use of his storage stall. Quarters will be obtained for this firm when vacancies occur at the expiration of a month's notice to tenants using stalls for storage purposes.

NEAR DROWNING IN NORTH BRANCH

Fifteen-Year-Old Girl Escapes Death After Fainting in Water.

Gertie Lee, aged 15 years, 15 Recent street, narrowly escaped drowning at the north branch bathing camp Wednesday afternoon about 4 o'clock, when she fainted in the water, while bathing. Spectators of the accident carried the little unconscious form to shore, and the pumpmotor was summoned from the central fire hall. Dr. H. S. Ferguson was also called.

The little girl was revived in a few minutes, and taken to her home by Fire Chief John Aitken, who informed The Advertiser that Gertie fainted while in bathing at Port Stanley July 1, and almost lost her life by drowning.

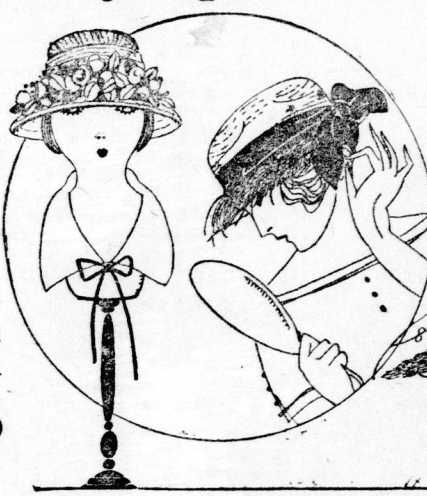
