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HOLY NAME MEN PLAN GREAT RALLY IN CITY SUNDAY

Societies From St. Thomas, Alvinston, Strathroy and West Lorne Will Unite.

ARRANGE PARADE

Throughout the diocese of London, Sunday will be observed as Holy Name Rally Day, when the various societies of each of the 11 districts will unite for special outdoor services. The Holy Name Society has grown with such rapidity in Canada and the United States during the last few years that there is hardly a Catholic parish on the continent without a unit. Under the direction of Rt. Rev. Bishop Fallon the organization has been extended to every parish of the London diocese, with Rev. Father J. Stanley, P.P. of Woodstock, diocesan director. The aims of the society are to stamp out the vices of cursing, blasphemy, perjury, and all practices opposed to the second commandment of God, and to build up the virtues through which greater reverence will be procured for the holy names of God and Jesus and for all that pertains to religion. The society is exclusively religious in character, and the members are pledged to receive holy communion on the second Sunday of each month. The members of the Holy Name Societies of the city parishes, of St. Thomas, Strathroy, West Lorne and Alvinston, will assemble on the grounds of St. Peter's Cathedral at 2:30 Sunday afternoon, and accompanied by the Marconi Band, under the direction of Prof. Venuta, and the Holy Angels Cadet Band of St. Thomas, will march to the Sacred Heart convent grounds on Queen's avenue. The route to be followed will cover Dufferin avenue, Wellington street, Queen's avenue, Marlborough and Dundas streets, and the parade will enter the grounds from Dundas street. The program at the grounds will include the singing of hymns by the Holy Name men, directed by William T. Mullins, and a reception of new members and the renewal of the Holy Name pledge by all the men present. Rev. M. J. Forristal, professor of canon law and liturgy at St. Peter's Seminary, will preach the sermon. Benediction of the blessed sacrament will be given by His Lordship Rt. Rev. M. F. Fallon, D.D., and the services will conclude with the singing of "Holy God, We Praise Thy Name."

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UP FROM THE DEATH CELL

Kane Discloses To the Warden a Torture Chamber, the Tombs—They Are Obliterated

SYNOPSIS.
Curly Kane wins his way to regeneration while in prison. A wild lad, he killed two carmen in a hold-up and after 17 months in murderers' row got a new trial, with a life imprisonment sentence instead of death. He studies law, reads, trains himself to be a magazine writer, and conceives the idea of a law permitting parole for life prisoners who serve fifteen years. By finesse he gets it passed. A new warden, with modern ideas, makes Kane his private secretary. After thirteen years Kane walks alone two hours in the open country.

CHAPTER XL.
During my two hours' absence from the prison the warden had been to the capital building and had there held a conference with the state board of control, the governor and the attorney-general. Some of the intended activities and changes were made known to me in the warden's office upon my return.
"The board thinks that we ought to cut the expenses as much as possible," he told me, soon after we had entered his private office, "and among other things they cut off the jobs and salaries of five different men formerly employed here; three of the places will remain unfilled, and two places formerly held by paid employees will be taken over by prisoners."

"That will make the payroll quite a bit smaller," was my only comment.
"Yes, it will that," he went on. "I explained to them that you were already saving the state the expense of a man to do the work you're doing. Then it was decided not to fill the master mechanic's position with a free man, because we have here a high-class man that can fill it. A prisoner will drive the warden's car also. And the new road camp to be established will be composed of prisoners put out there to work strictly on their own word of honor that they will not leave."

"No doubt they'll be picked with care," I remarked.
"All that it's possible to bestow," he laughingly answered. "It's something new here, but they're doing it successfully in three or four other states, and we can, too."
Just then I heard the gong that called the prisoners to their meals.

I Get a Room Outside.
"There's the bell," I told him. "Was there anything you wanted before I go in?"
"Keep your seat a minute," said he. "I was just going to tell you that we've arranged for you and some of the other boys to sleep outside here. There's a room on the second floor above us here—just across the hallway from the barber shop—and you may occupy it. It should be best for you to go in and move all your belongings out here now."

I must have looked my surprise.
"That's right—I mean it," he assured me, with a humorous twinkle in his eyes. "You're to sleep out here and take your meals outside too."
"Well, I hardly know what to say," I told him. "I doubt whether getting a pardon would afford me much more joy than that does. You have no idea, warden, what that means to one who has been sleeping in a small steel vault as long as I have."
"Now, that's all right," he returned, rising. "But don't lose any time palaverin' about it—go on in and pack up."

"There's not much to pack," said I, starting for the door. "I'll be able to bring it all in two trips."
The room to which I moved was a front corner room with four windows, two facing south and two west. And because of sheer happiness due to the change, I did not sleep more than two hours that first night outside the walls.

How We Worked.
The warden's chauffeur and I were the only two prisoners who slept in that building. There were five others—the barn man, the fellow who cared for the incubators at the chicken houses, another chauffeur, the caretaker of the dairy herd, and the furnace man—who slept at other places outside the prison inclosure proper. The chauffeurs were the only two whose duties took them off the prison lands, but all the rest of those who slept outside—a few who were out during the daytime only—had the run of that whole reservation when not at work.

My own hours for work were irregular. Sometimes the warden's business would require his absence for two or three days; and with the exception of the mail that related strictly to the more important institutional business, none of it would be answered until his return. And whenever mail matter piled up on us a little bit, we would simply get busy with it and—with the exception of time for meals—turn it all off without stopping.

Because of the fact that a great deal of the correspondence related to matters that would require careful thought upon the warden's part, which led to discussion between us, a great deal more time was required during that first year of his administration than was for the later correspondence. Many times—as often perhaps as three times a week—we would remain in the office late at night, and most of that time would be but in discussing matters pertaining to past management of the place and hoped-for future management.

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WANTS MAYOR TO GIVE CITY COUNCIL HOLIDAYS

There will be another municipal convention in London directly circumstances permit, Mayor Wenige says. He refers to his proposed introduction here of the "commission form of government."
New types of civic government, as suggested by His Worship, must meet with the approval of the Ontario Legislature, and as different municipalities, while desirous of change of some sort, have all slightly divergent opinions. The mayor proposes that representatives of the several interested communities assemble here to outline a form most likely to be acceptable to all.
Already communicated with, several municipalities have agreed to send delegates, and they await now the pleasure of Mayor Wenige and council.
