AUSTRALIA BELIEVES IN CANADA'S TRADE

New Traffic Reciprocity Bill Surprises Public, But Not Government Circles.

Sydney, Australia, Sept. 29.—The commonwealth government's Canadian tariff reciprocity bill which was introduced in the House of Representatives last Friday was a complete surprise to the public, although the proposal had been incubating for two years.

The general attitude of the Australians has been an unwillingness to allow the United States to supplant this country's British trade connections by United States trade. This is especially the case with regard to the tariff on newspaper, in which it is believed that any substantial advantage given Canada will be returned in goods.

When Premier S. M. Bruce decided to return to Australia from England after attending the imperial conference in London last autumn direct by way of the United States it was no secret that he was still hopeful that the British parliament would not reject the proposed preference on dried fruits.
