Clearing and Much Warmer.

Toronto, Ont., June 29, 11 p.m.—The western low area which moved north-east during yesterday has today moved south-west into the lake region. A heavy rain has fallen over a large portion of the Province of Ontario. It has, however, been heavier near Toronto than elsewhere, and in the south-western counties there has been very little. A prominent heat wave is south and west of the lake region.
