REOPENING OF TOWN SCHOOLS

Nearly Two Hundred Permits Issued and One Thousand at School.

The town schools re-opened on Monday morning after the summer vacation with a full attendance. The Secretary of the School Board, Miss Ethel Hogan, has issued one hundred and seventy-nine permits to new beginners. One hundred and one of these were for the Grammar School building and the remaining seventy-eight for the Roseberry Street School.

There are now 420 pupils attending the Roseberry street school and 579 attending the Grammar school building. This makes practically 1000 children attending school already this term, with many more yet to come in. Some grades in both schools are already overcrowded, and the School Board are finding it difficult to provide accommodation. In some cases pupils could be moved from one school building to the other, but many parents feel they want their children to attend the nearest school, which is making it hard for the School Board to regulate matters.

VIRTUE IN THE NAME OF NEW DANCE.

NEW YORK, Aug. 27.—The leading dancing masters of Canada and the United States, in convention here, have evolved a slow, graceful step which they have named "The Wesleyan."

They announced this morning that they hoped it might receive the approval of the Methodist church, the anti-dancing edict of which the convention has deplored each day it has been in session.

The bride wore a becoming suit of taupe drapery with hat to match and carried a beautiful bouquet of roses. After the ceremony breakfast was served at the home of the bride's sister, Mrs. Alfred Renault to which the relatives and intimate friends of the contracting parties were invited.

Mr. and Mrs. Ruet left on the Ocean Limited for St. John from where they will motor to the groom's home at St. Anne's to spend a few days, going by way of Maine, the bride travelling in a black and white checked suit with hat to match. On their return they will reside in Campbellton.

Many beautiful gifts were received, the groom's gift to the bride being a diamond and sapphire set ring.

TOWN ENGINEER HAS RESIGNED

Council Deals With Several Important Matters—Others Over.

A meeting of the town council was held last Tuesday, His Worship Mayor Murray in the chair with Councillors Jamieson, Dickey, Bisset, Ingram and Currie present.

The minutes of the previous meeting were read and confirmed.

A communication was read from the Firemen asking for a refund of a portion of the license fee paid for the International shows recently held here. Laid on table.

Mr. W. J. S. W. tendered his resignation as town engineer, to take effect the end of September. Resignation accepted.

The usual departmental accounts were gone into and ordered paid.

Councillor Currie brought up the matter of Mr. Thos. Ellisworth forbidding the town engineer laying a plank sidewalk on Pond street. There was considerable discussion over the matter as to who owned the street, and on motion the town clerk was instructed to interview Mr. Ellisworth and get his permission to lay the plank sidewalk. Mr. Currie also took up the general conditions of the residents of this section. They have neither light, water, sewerage, streets or sidewalks, and would be better if they resided outside the town. Coun. Currie asked the Electric Light department to run a wire from Ramsay street through this section and join it to the service at Prince William street. He also asked for a light on Queen street and more light on Ramsay street, emphasizing the fact that former Councils had neglected Ward 1.

Councillor Dickey reported recommending that a storm sewer be put in to avoid the flooding of Mr. W. H. Gray's basement and that work on the sewer be started at once. On enquiry Councillor Dickey stated the cost of the same would be the vicinity of \$1,000. Report received and adopted.

Councillor Currie brought up the matter of licensing the dance hall.

Matter allowed to stand over until next meeting.

Councillor Bisset brought up the matter of the Council the necessity of a horse at the electric lighting station, claiming that it was an absolute necessity. Referred to Electric Light Committee to bring in a report at the next meeting of the council.

On motion of Councillor Currie it was decided to hold the land the town owned at the corner of Prince William and King streets for school building purposes.

Councillor Currie brought up the matter of the appointment of a town manager. He felt that now the town engineer had resigned, the council should appoint a town manager. He named an engineer in Moncton who was at present making \$4,000 per year he said he had been informed would accept the position for \$3,000. There was some little discussion over the matter, but no action was taken.

Building Inspector Adams was heard before the council. He reported that many of the buildings being erected today did not comply with the building by-laws. The manner in which the chimneys were being erected seemed to be the greatest fault, the woodwork about the chimneys. He also named two parties who had shingled roofs in the fire district. The Inspector wanted to know what course the council would have him pursue. There was considerable discussion over the building by-laws in which every phase of the question was gone into, even to the issuance of the building permit, and several motions were passed relative thereto. The unanimous feeling of the council was the building by-laws were to be enforced to the letter.

The finance committee was authorized to dispose of the \$20,000 Fire Debentures at the best possible price.

There being nothing further before the meeting the council adjourned.

SLEEP WALKING GIRL DROWNED

Montreal, Aug. 30.—Death under tragic circumstances was revealed with the finding of the body of Miss Emma Senecal, member of a well known family of Boucherville (Que.), floating in the St. Lawrence River. Evidence deduced at the brief inquiry which was held immediately after the finding of the body, showed that the unfortunate woman was a victim of sleep walking, and that she had left her home while in a somnambulist condition on Friday evening or early Saturday morning, walked into the river, and lost her life.

New Company Organized to Take Over Schooner Harry A. McLennan.

FREDERICTON, Sept. 1.—Letters patent have been issued incorporating Alexander McLennan, Campbellton, and Thomas Nagle and Charles McKerrison, St. John, as the Harry A. McLennan, Limited, with a capital stock of \$125,000 and the head office to be at Campbellton. The object of the company is to purchase or otherwise acquire the ship Harry A. McLennan, together with all requisite equipment for the same, to purchase goods and to carry on the business of a shipowner in all the branches.

FREDERICTON, Sept. 1.—Hon. Dr. E. A. Smith, minister of Lands and Mines, is said by the Gleaner today to be about to retire from the provincial government.

In political circles this morning it was declared that Dr. Smith had already tendered his resignation to the lieutenant-governor, but this was officially denied, although it is unofficially admitted by his colleagues in the cabinet that the retirement of the minister of lands and mines is expected.

ENGINES CRASHED MANY INJURED

Collision Between Passenger and Work Trains Resulted in Many Being Hurt.

St. John, N. B., Aug. 31.—The collision on Saturday evening between the C. N. B. express running from Moncton to Tormentine and a work train at Vimy Ridge, formerly Evans Sid-ing, west of Sackville was more serious than the Moncton despatch indicated. It was learned to-day that nearly every one on board the express was injured, in some way, or badly shaken up.

NO DUCK SHOOTING UNTIL SEPT. 15

Duck shooting in New Brunswick does not begin until Sept. 15. There has been a mistaken impression in some quarters that the duck season opened Sept. 1, but such is not the case.

In former years the duck season began earlier, but now that Canada is a party to the migratory bird law duck shooting in the province and Nova Scotia is illegal until Sept. 15, and extends from that date until Dec. 31.

The season for woodcock, Wilson snipe or jacksnipe also opens on Sept. 15, but closes on Nov. 30. There is no partridge shooting in New Brunswick this year.

Local sportsmen regard it as important that the proper dates be known. There is a stiff penalty for shooting before the legal opening of the season.

NEWCASTLE GIRL GETS SCHOLARSHIP.

Fredericton, Sept. 1.—Miss Gwendolyn Belyea, of Newcastle, has been awarded a scholarship by the Imperial Order of the Daughters of the Empire as a part of the Canadian war memorial.

Nine scholarships of four years each worth \$250 a year have been awarded during the past few days by the I. O. D. E. in the Dominion, to children of soldiers who fell in the great war, to help them carry on their education. In New Brunswick, Miss Belyea, who passed the U. N. B. matriculations, was chosen the winner. She is a daughter of Major W. H. Belyea, of Newcastle, who went overseas with the 26th Battalion, and was killed in France early in the war while fighting with that unit.

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ANNOUNCE FIRST DROP IN FLOUR

Millers Have Made Slight Cut in Price of New Crop Flour.

Montreal, Sept. 1.—Prospects for a decrease in the cost of bread were further quickened yesterday when the prominent Canadian spring wheat millers announced considerable reductions in the price of new crop spring wheat flour, the announcement coinciding with the exit of the Canada Wheat Board, with prices running from \$1.10 to \$1.50 lower than the government standard flour was selling at.
