NATIONS LEAGUE

Chapter To Study International Literature

PLANS FOR FESTIVAL
"Chanuka" To Be Celebrated Here On December 15

The London Hadassah Chapter has joined the League of Nations, sending the membership fee to Ottawa and receiving important literature on the work of the league, with which the members will familiarize themselves.

Interesting business was discussed at this week's meeting of Hadassah, over which Mrs. William Left presided, and much interest was shown by the members in the League of Nations, of which they are now a part.

Announcement was made of the Zionist and Hadassah convention to take place, probably in Winnipeg, in January. A number of delegates, to be appointed later, will attend from the local chapter.

The fitting celebration of Chanuka, the important Jewish festival, which falls during the week of December 12, was considered. This year Hadassah will mark the festival on December 15, the night of the fourth candle. Candles are lighted, one each night, until eight are burning, as a pretty custom in connection with the festival.

A dance and fair will be the Hadassah form of celebration on the evening of December 15. Attractive booths are being arranged and members who will be in charge include Mrs. William Left, president and general convener; Mrs. A. Packer, Mrs. Wilinsky, Mrs. Isidore Goldstick, Mrs. Weinstein, Mrs. S. C. Harris, Miss Leah Lewis, Mrs. Bernard Wolfe, Mrs. Burns and Mrs. W. Left.

Goldstick, members who have promised to give benefit teas this autumn are Mrs. H. Wolfe, King street; Mrs. C. H. Shkel, fees to the value of \$70 have been sent to Hadassah headquarters at Ottawa, in payment for 64 local members.

Among the other interesting plans made was the drafting of an educational program for the winter meetings, which will include debates, addresses and readings. Mrs. L. Jessel and Mrs. Holif will contribute readings at the two next meetings.

Dr. L. Jessel was this week's speaker, attending the meeting to lay before Hadassah the P'nai Eritz plan for a Hebrew school in London, which it is hoped to establish shortly. This will be supplementary to the public schools of the city and will teach the Hebrew tongue, religion and history.

The evening concluded enjoyably with refreshments served by Mrs. S. C. Harris, Mrs. Bernard Wolfe and Mrs. Isidore Goldstick.
