The daughter of the Marquis d'Hozier received the veil in the Carmelite convent in Paris a few weeks ago.

Twenty acres of land near Lake Linden, Detroit, Mich., have been presented to the Sisters of Jesus and Mary, who will erect on the grounds a \$50,-000 building.

For the past few weeks thousands of persons have visited the new monastery of the sisters of the Precious Blood in Brooklynn, N. Y. The building, when finished, will be one of the handsomest of the kind in the country.

The Little Sisters of the Poor possess 255 houses scattered over nearly every country in Europe, Asia, Africa, America and Australia. No fewer than 33,000 men and women are sheltered in these.

Brother Kiernan, one of the prominent Trappist monks, who came from Ireland to found Now Mellary Monastery at Dubuque, Iowa, forty-five years ago, is dead. He was the historian of the order.

In an audience granted on the occasion of the marriage in the Patrizi family, His Hammes spoke of the Apostolic letter which he is preparing to address to the English people. There is good reason to believe that he is also preparing an encyclical on the religious question of the East.

When he was unable, toward the end of his life, to attend me when on horseback, he use to watch for my return, and the servant would tell him his master was coming down the hill or through the moor, and, although he did not use any gesture to explain his meaning, Camp was never known to mistake him, but either went down at the front to go up the hill, or at the back to get down to the mooraide."

Toat was cortainly a very wise dog. He was a good one, too, for he was always ashamed of his one bad act, and never repeated it.
