The daughter of the Marquis d'Ho-
zier received the veil in the Carmelite
convent in Paris a few weeks ago.

Twenty acres of land near Lake Lin-
den, Detroit, Mich., have been present-
ed to the Sisters of Jesus and Mary,
who will erect on the grounds a \$50,-
000 building.

For the past few weeks thousands of
persons have visited the new monastery
of the sisters of the Precious Blood in
Brooklyn, N. Y. The building, when
finished, will be one of the handsomest
of the kind in the country.

The Little Sisters of the Poor pos-
sess 255 houses scattered over nearly
every country in Europe, Asia, Africa,
America and Australia. No fewer than
33,000 men and women are sheltered in
these.

Brother Kiernan, one of the promi-
nent Trappist monks, who came from
Ireland to found New Mellary Monas-
tery at Dubuque, Iowa, forty-five years
ago, is dead. He was the historian of
the order.

In an audience granted on the occa-
sion of the marriage in the Patrizi fam-
ily, His Holiness spoke of the Apostolic
letter which he is preparing to address
to the English people. There is good
reason to believe that he is also prepar-
ing an encyclical on the religious ques-
tion of the East.

The official journal of St. Petersburg
publishes the appointment of Mr. Scool-
ski to be Minister Resident to the Holy
See. This event cannot be over estimat-
ed, taken in connection with the re-
cent nomination of an official represen-
tative of Prussia, another non-Catholic
power, to the Court of His Holiness.

Sir Walter Scott's Dog "Camp."

"The wisest dog I ever had," said
Sir Walter Scott, "was what is called
the bull-dog terrier. I taught him to
understand a great many words, inso-
much that I am positive that the com-
munication betwixt the canine species
and ourselves might be greatly enlarg-
ed. Camp once bit the baker, who was
bringing bread to the family. I chast-
ised him, and explained the enormity
of his offence; after which, to the last
moment of his life, he never heard the
least allusion to the story, in whatever
tone or voice it was mentioned, without
getting up and retiring into the darkest
corner of the room, with great appear-
ance of distress. Then if you said the
baker was well paid, or the baker was
not hurt after all, Camp came forth
from his hiding place, capered, and
barked, and rejoiced.

When he was unable, toward the end
of his life, to attend me when on horse-
back, he used to watch for my return,
and the servant would tell him his
master was coming down the hill or
through the moor, and, although he did
not use any gesture to explain his
meaning, Camp was never known to
mistake him, but either went down at
the front to go up the hill, or at the
back to get down to the moor-side."

That was certainly a very wise dog.
He was a good one, too, for he was
always ashamed of his one bad act, and
never repeated it.

No. 12.

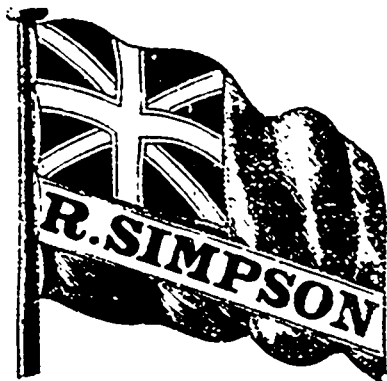
LADIES' CIRCLE.
