CONTRACTS OPEN.

TILBURY CENTRE, ONT.—Messrs. J. A. R. Kidd contemplate erecting a 12,000 bushel elevator this summer.

CARRBERRY, MAN.—A by-law to raise the sum of \$6,000 for fire protection will be submitted to the ratepayers.

GLENCOL, ONT.—It is said that over twenty new dwellings, will be erected in this town during the present year.

RYLSTONE, ONT.—Mr. C. O'Connor invites tenders until Saturday next for the erection of a church in this village.

INGERSOLL, ONT.—The School Board is having plans and estimates prepared for a new collegiate institute building.

ORILLIA, ONT.—A deputation from this town visited Toronto Junction last week for the purpose of inspecting the electric light plant, having in view the purchase of plant.

NORTH TORONTO, ONT.—The town hall is to be enlarged and improved. The matter will be discussed at the next meeting of the Council.

GLADSTONE, MAN.—The Building Committee of the Presbyterian church are asking for plans for a new building, to cost in the neighborhood of \$3,000.

BOWESVILLE, ONT.—Mr. David Gamble, of this place, will receive tenders until the 11th inst. for erecting a spire on the Presbyterian church, South Gloucester.

GUYON, QUE.—B. J. Kiernan invites tenders until the 20th inst. for the erection of a presbytery in this village. Plans at office of Roy & Gauthier, architects, Montreal.

FORT WILLIAM, ONT.—The Canadian Pacific Railway Company will erect another elevator and a flour warehouse at this place, in addition to other improvements to be made.

PETERBORO, ONT.—It is understood that Messrs. Ahearn & Soper, of Ottawa, will make a proposition to the Town Council for the construction of an electric railway here.

SARNIA, ONT.—J. D. Lowrie, Township Clerk, has been instructed to advertise for tenders for the construction of the Lamont drain, tenders to be sent in not later than the 23th inst.

GOBERGICH, ONT.—W. Lane, Clerk of the County of Huron, will receive tenders until the 1st of June for heating the court-house in this town by hot water, hot air, steam or electricity.

LONDON, ONT.—John Pope, Treasurer, invites tenders until the 13th of April for the purchase of \$725,000 worth of debentures.—Mr. Thomas Cousins will erect a frame house at No. 123 Bathurst street, at a cost of \$1,000.

WALKERTON, ONT.—Mr. F. S. O'Connor, Secretary Public School Board, will receive tenders until the 15th of April for heating the public school building with hot water. The building is a two-story brick, containing eight rooms.

WALKERVILLE, ONT.—A new lock-up and chief's office will be erected this summer.—The Water Commissioners have decided to ask the Council to submit a by-law to the ratepayers to raise the sum of \$55,000 for the extension of the waterworks.

HALIFAX, N. S.—The Fire Commissioners have decided to purchase a new engine, at a cost of \$5,000.—The Board of School Commissioners has decided to erect a new eight-roomed school

on the Janet Mosher lot. Mr. Henry Busch will prepare the plans.

PALMERSTON, ONT.—R. Shields, Secretary Public School Board, invites tenders until Wednesday, the 15th inst. for the erection of an eight roomed brick school building, with stone basement, in this town. Plans may be seen at the office of the Secretary.

ROCKFORD, ONT.—Mr. Thos. Darling intends erecting a fine cottage on his island this spring.—Mr. Fairchild, of New York, has bought a point of land and is going to spend a few thousands this spring.—Mr. Arthur Dickey intends building a fine cottage here this spring.

CORNWALL, ONT.—The project to build a new Catholic church on the site of the present St. Columban's is being talked of with good prospects of being carried out. A large building adjoining the proposed site has been purchased, and it is thought work will be commenced at no distant date.

EAST TORONTO, ONT.—Operations will be commenced on the construction of the electric railway as soon as the weather will permit. A large quantity of steel rails is expected to arrive from England about the end of the present month. Mr. D. G. Stephenson is president of the company.

BROOKVILLE, ONT.—At a congregational meeting of the First Presbyterian church, held on Monday night, to discuss the question of increased accommodation, it was decided to erect a gallery at a cost of about \$3,000. It was also decided to expend \$1,000 in making other improvements on the interior of the church.

ST. JOHN, N. B.—Mayor Peters to day, on behalf of the city, signed the amended agreement under which the Government is to extend the Intercolonial railway along the harbor front, and it is expected the railway authorities will at once be instructed to call for tenders, so that the work may be completed this year.

PRINCE ALBERT, ONT.—Mr. C. E. Steele, manager of the Hudson Bay Company's flour mill at Winnipeg, was in town recently making arrangements for the erection of a large elevator and adding additional equipment to the company's mill in the east end. The work will be proceeded with as soon as possible.

PORT DALHOUSIE, ONT.—The Town Council has granted the St. Catharines, Merriton and Thorold Street Railway Company the right to construct and operate an electric railway through this village on condition that the road is built from here to St. Catharines and running by July 1. It will probably be built through to Niagara Falls.

TORONTO JUNCTION, ONT.—Plans for the new High School Building have been approved. It will cost \$18,000. The proposed town hall will cost \$20,000. The corporation is discussing the advisability of erecting a new fire hall. A representative of a rubber company in Toronto was in town recently looking for a suitable site on which to erect a factory.

WOODSTOCK, ONT.—Building operations in this city promise to be brisk this season. The contract will be awarded shortly for the new Wind Motor Company's factory, and work has already been commenced on the Great Western mill, and Thos. McCloy's new flour mill. A number of private residences and business blocks will also be erected.

ST. BONIFACE, MAN.—A meeting was held recently to discuss the erection of another bridge across the Red River, at a cost of \$70,000. It was decided to submit the question to a vote of the ratepayers.—The Sisters of St. Boniface hospital are making arrangements to borrow the sum of \$59,000 to erect the new addition to their present institution. The plans are now being prepared.

WINNIPEG, MAN.—Mr. Jas. Baird, proprietor of the Seymour House, has decided to erect an addition to the rear of the present building, at a cost of \$10,000.—The trustees of the congregation of the Children of Israel, whose synagogue was
