THE SENATE OF CANADA

BILL Y².

An Act for the relief of Florence Rose Wright Clark.

Preamble.

WHEREAS Florence Rose Wright Clark, residing at the city of Verdun, in the province of Quebec, stenographer, wife of William Leslie Clark, salesman, who is domiciled in Canada and residing at the said city, has by her petition alleged that they were married on the seventh day of November, A.D. 1931, at the said city, she then being Florence Rose Wright, a spinster; and whereas by her petition she has prayed that, because of his adultery since then, their marriage be dissolved; and whereas the said marriage and adultery have been proved by evidence adduced and it is expedient that the prayer of her petition be granted: Therefore His Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate and House of Commons of Canada, enacts as follows:—

Marriage dissolved.

1. The said marriage between Florence Rose Wright and William Leslie Clark, her husband, is hereby dissolved, and shall be henceforth null and void to all intents and purposes whatsoever.

Right to marry again.

2. The said Florence Rose Wright may at any time hereafter marry any man whom she might lawfully marry if the said marriage with the said William Leslie Clark had not been solemnized.
