SURCHARGE ON MEXICAN TEXTILES—EMBARGO ON CANADIAN NEWSPRINT

Mr. Ambrose Hubert Peddle (Grand Falls-White Bay-Labrador): I have a question for the Minister of Industry, Trade and Commerce. Will the minister advise us whether negotiations have been resumed between his officials and officials of the government of the Republic of Mexico in connection with the imposition of a surcharge on Mexican textile materials entering Canada and the placing by the Mexican government, in retaliation, of an embargo on all Canadian newsprint?

Hon. Jean-Luc Pepin (Minister of Industry, Trade and Commerce): If these negotiations have not been resumed today I have great hopes they will be resumed very soon. The problem is a very difficult one. As hon. members know, the Mexicans last year increased their export of cotton yarns to Canada by about ten times. We had to act. We imposed the surtax in November last and the Mexicans have formed a very low opinion of our move in this instance. We feel we were justified, though, and we are trying to come to terms with them now.

Mr. Peddle: Will the minister agree to make a statement in the House as soon as negotiations are resumed?

Mr. Pepin: I will keep the House informed.

Mr. David Anderson (Esquimalt-Saanich): My question is supplementary to the one dealing with restraint on textile imports. It is directed to the Minister of Industry, Trade and Commerce. HOUSING

NATIONAL COUNCIL ON HOUSING AND URBAN AFFAIRS
