saying that they have made up this story in order to advance their ends. That is hatred. It fans the flames of hatred.

Indeed, we should be considering whether or not there should be laws in Canada, as there are laws in Germany, that forbid the dissemination of such hatred as to deny the existence of a Holocaust which swept away in its ranks not only the six million Jews who were gassed only because they were Jews but the gypsies, the mentally ill and, as well, the other 25 million people of Europe who died as a result of that Holocaust. That ultimate Holocaust was caused by hatred and the propensity to say that only one race was greater than all others, something which is exactly the opposite of the beliefs of this Parliament and all it has stood for and fought for over the decades.

This is a matter of fighting for civilization. When passing this particular Bill we must not feel as though we have achieved something great here today. It is merely a stop-gap measure. In the general thrust of this House, I hope we shall continue assiduously to try to promote and carry on a battle against violence in all of its forms. The idea of combatting such things as rape and violence against women in the form of pornography or hate literature, or any other thing such as the advocacy of capital punishment, should continue by this Parliament in order that reverence for human life be established and that this Parliament be able to set an example for other Parliaments throughout the world.

I thank you for your attentiveness, Mr. Speaker, and for the time of the House allowing me to be able to express my deeper concerns which go beyond this particular Bill. I hope they will be there for us to continue to use as guideposts for the future and for the great heritage of this Parliament of Canada.

CANADIAN WILDLIFE SERVICE CUT-BACKS

Mr. Bill Blaikie (Winnipeg-Birds Hill): Mr. Speaker, yesterday the cuts in the Canadian Wildlife Service took effect, an appropriate day for them to have done so, because only a fool would still try to justify the terrible mistake the Tories have made in this area.

Witness after witness testified before the Standing Committee on Fisheries and Forestry that the research to be abandonned as a result of the cuts would not be picked up by the private sector, the universities, or the provinces, and that is undoubtedly the case. Yet the Minister of the Environment (Mrs. Blais-Grenier) decided to have eyes that would not see and ears that would not hear, and has stubbornly refused to reconsider.
