Fort Amherst.—This is a Stationary Light, on the Southern head of the entrance of St. John's Hareboar.

Cape Spear.—This is a powerful Revolving Light hurning at an elevation of 275 feet above the level of the sea, and showing a brilliant flush at intervals of one minute. In clear weather it may be seen from sea, in any direction, at the distance of thirty five miles.

Harbour Grace.—This is a powerful Fixed Light slunde on Harbour Grace Island, in Conception Bay, extending Eastwardly of seaward in a direction by Compass from North to South West.

Bonavisla.—This Light revolves every two initialists, showing a red and white flash alternately; and it is elevated 150 feet above the level of the sea.

St. Peler's.—A Light House has been erected by the French Government on Gallanry Head, near Cape Noir. The Light is a fixed one. It burns at all elevation of about 210 feet above the level of the sea. It may be seen (in passing by the S.) from W.N.W. to N.N.E. at the distance of 18 or 20 miles in clear weather. In passing by the N., it is shut in by high land from N. N.E. to W. N. W.
