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- taboesimkajētck*, Lawrence-
town; two small branches
flowing through sand.
- tabooetoonik*, Rustico Bay,
P. E. I.; having two outlets.
- taboesimkak*, Taboosintak, hav-
ing two branches.
- tadoosokē*, The Saguenay River.
- takamegootck*, Tatamagouche;
barred across the entrance
with sand.
- tāwanok*, Framboise.
- tāwitk*, Grand Passage, Digby;
(2) Grand Narrows, C. B.;
the outlet, narrows.
- tāwitkētck*, Petite Passage,
Digby; (2) Little narrows, C.
B.; the little outlet.
- tāwōpskik*, Annapolis River;
rushing out between rocks.
- teakoo-seboo*, Mink River, P.
E. I.
- tedumuneboogwēk*, Ship Har-
bour; blunt harbour.
- tejegootck*, Cape Enrage.
- telakadētck*, Little Tracadie, P.
E. I.; the little settlement.
- telakadik*, Tracadie, P. E. I.;
the inhabited place.
- tenapsketegenoozwōmk*, Block-
House, house built of rock.
- tewitnotck*, East Bay, C. B.
- tobeadookook*, Sixth Lake on
Liverpool River, (2) branch
of the Liverpool River.
- tobigētck*, Brook Village.
- togwātckul*, Double Brook,
Miramichi.
- toēgunok*, Strait of Canso, the
opening.
- tulesiphk*, Tryon River, P. E. I.;
- (2) Pinette River, P. E. I.
- tumagēnōpsk*, place in Mira-
michi; the pipe-stone place.
- tungwaligunētckwākade*, Crane
Island; home of the cranes.
- tcebookt*, (*uktcebookt*), Halifax
Harbour; the great long har-
bour.
- tcebooktootck*, Buctouche; the
little long harbour.
- tcegowēsēbook*, Bass River.
- tcegoonkootck*, Table Island near
Tatamagouche.
- tcētēgwilk*, Devil's Island; it
splashes over a little at a time.
- tcigunikpe*, Falls above Freder-
icton.
- tcijiktook*, on the Cornwallis
River.
- tcipkoodōpsk*, ; flow-
ing slowly over rocks.
- tcugulsel*, ; rockweed.
- tculokwējook*, Sculpin Harbour,
Guys. Co.; the sculpin.
