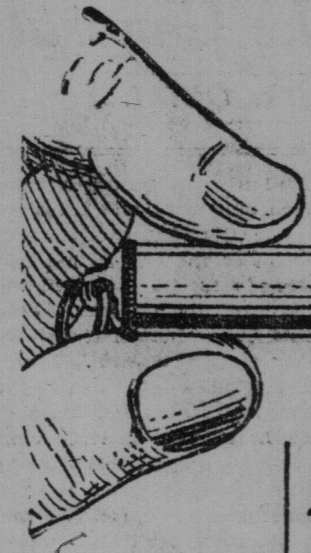

LAYMAN OPPOSED TO CHURCH UNION

Montreal Delegate's Vigorous Attack Stirred Placidity of Assembly.

IS CAUSING DISCORD

Rev. Professor Murray, However, Declared That Sentiment is Favorable.

"Moderator, moderator," was the cry from a number of commissioners at the General Assembly yesterday afternoon after Walter Paul, one of the lay commissioners from Montreal, had stirred up the peaceful waters with a vigorous attack on the church union project.

This was the fourth series of addresses, pro and con, in the big issue, and the commissioners had reached their limit.

Someone moved that speakers be called to time at ten minutes. Rev. Dr. Sedgwick began discussing the proposal while the vote was being taken.

Dr. Duval thundered out that the lay was that no question could be discussed when a vote had been called for.

Rev. Dr. MacKenzie said that as moderator when the time arrived, but not with such a provincial non-union sentiment as existed at the present time. The unpolluted vote, he believed, was against union, in addition to that actually registered. Until a great change took place he saw danger ahead in even keeping the proposition before the church. It was causing unrest and discord, and keeping large numbers from making contributions.

Rev. Dr. McDuncan said the speeches at the congress calling for a united action against the many entrenched national evils, called for the Christian church to be united and marshalled like a mighty army. This could be hastened by union with the Methodists and Congregationalists.

Confession of Faith.
Rev. Dr. Campbell, Montreal, argued that religious truth would be sacrificed by shelving the confession of faith, and the efficiency of Presbyterianism be lessened by merging it with the other denominations.

Rev. Prof. Murray said that the sentiment in favor of organic union as registered in the ballot, was so overwhelming that it was the duty of the General Assembly to proceed with its negotiations for its consummation.

The debate will be resumed at the first order of business this afternoon.

SYNOPSIS OF DOMINION LAND REGULATIONS.

ANY person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years of age, may obtain a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Duties—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister. In the case of a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter section alongside his homestead. Price \$8.00 per acre.

Duties—Must reside upon the homestead or pre-emption six months in each of three years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to earn homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres extra.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption may enter for a purchase homestead in certain districts. Price \$5.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside on the land in each of three years, and cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$100.
