bushels in 1914, an increase in total yield of 63 per cent, in area harvested. In average yield per acre and in total yield the fall wheat harvest of 1915 is therefore expected to be the largest on record. In Ontario the total estimated yield is 27.080,000 from 972,000 acres, an average of 27.86 bushels per acre, and in Alberta the other large fall wheat province, the total yield is 6-225,000 bushels from 215,700 acres, an average of 28.86 bushels per acre.

Meteorological Observatory Destroyed by Violent Disturbances.

ROME, Aug. 11.—The meteorogical apparatus at Vesuvius Observatory was destroyed today by violent earth disturbances.

Scientists here expressed the belief that the volcano may be approaching another state of eruption.

The meteorogocial observatory is located on a westerly shoulder of Vesuvius, at a height of 2200 feeet.

Vesuvius has not been active since 1905. The volcano's last violent eruption occurred in 1872.
