

BIG BRICK PLANTS FOR MEAFORD

Mackenzie-Mann Building One to Cost Half Million—New Line to Kinrossville Said to Be Planned.

THORNHURST, Aug. 22.—(Special).—The belief is current that it will not be very many months before the Canadian Northern Railway will have a line built from Orillia to Kinrossville by way of Meaford, Thornhurst and Collingwood. This belief is strengthened by the extensive operations of Mackenzie and Mann, interests in establishing a huge brick plant between here and Meaford, which when complete will cost over half a million dollars. Work has been rushed all summer on this plant, which it is understood will be used largely in the manufacture of vitrified paving brick for street railway allowances.

The big firm of railway builders control nearly all the street car lines, not only in Canada, but also in South and Central America, and it has been almost impossible to get good vitrified paving brick for paying between the tracks, so there will be no trouble to get a market for the product of the brick plant here.

Considerable interest attaches to the origin of this plant and the source of how it came to be located here reads like a chapter from a romance, and shows how capital combined with science can be made to turn to advantage the hidden and overlooked resources of the country.

Don Price started it. When the Canadian Northern was seeking an entrance into Toronto by way of the Don Valley, a right of way was expropriated over a bit of land owned by a brick plant. The owners protested and they were offered a big price for this strip of land, a big price if the land were sold in suburban lots. They refused to accept and litigation followed. After experts from various parts of Canada and the United States had been heard from, Mackenzie and Mann were ordered to pay over a quarter of a million dollars for the strip of land they had taken. It was shown that this land was underlaid with a rare and very valuable deposit of shale of the Hudson series. This shale will make the finest grade of brick and terra cotta, and instead of paying for freight the railway builders were asked to pay for the land they took by the ton and yard at Kingston prices.

Secure Deposits at Meaford. This started Mackenzie and Mann thinking and the biggest experts on clay products in the United States and Canada were called in to ascertain if similar clay could be found elsewhere in Canada. By looking up the authorities it was found that Dr. Stearns Hunt, the famous geologist, who prophesied Sudbury and Cobalt, had located a similar bed of shale between this place and Meaford. Experts were rushed in here in the middle of winter to secure the deposit and big prices were paid for some eight hundred acres of land. Strange to say, the best part of the deposit was found on the old Corlies homestead where the well-known crown attorney of the City of Toronto was born.

As soon as the spring came huts were built and a gang of Italian workmen to build a railway switch, over a mile in length, from the deposit to the G.T.R. The foundations for the large plant were laid and work has been steadily carried on all summer, so that now the foundations are partly erected for the various buildings and kilns.

Another Big Plant. When the Mackenzie-Mann interests blanketed all this clay, they overlooked a fine outcrop of similar shale at Delhi, a few miles east of here, near Craigleith. A syndicate of Toronto people have taken up this shale, and another big plant will be established shortly under the name of The Delhi Brick Co.

The clay shale of which these companies have secured a monopoly belongs to the Hudson series and is of a blue-grey resembling soapstone. It is entirely different in analysis and texture from the Medina clay and shale found along the waterway which runs from Craigleith to Niagara, by way of Milton and Hamilton. This Hudson shale is a soft, bluish-grey, and is easily worked, and is found in an analysis almost identical to the clay of Canton, Ohio, New Brunswick, New York, and St. Lawrence, England. It burns smooth, and hard, vitrifies easily and has a beautiful red, blue and brown color, according to the temperature and quality of the flame used in burning.

80,000 Bricks a Day. The Mackenzie-Mann plant will be operated by what is called the direct process. Large drying furnaces will be operated to hasten the drying. The Deloit Company, on the other hand, owing to the favorable situation of their deposit, will operate by the dry press process. They will take the shale out of the bank in a dry condition, grind it in great grinding machines and feed the dry powder to dry presses that will turn out 80,000 bricks every 24 hours. These bricks as they leave the machine will be dry enough to send direct to the kilns. The manufacturing concern that is installing this dry process claims that this method produces the best quality of brick, and that the cost of firing is less than the old method of roofing and paving tiles, also glazed sewer pipes.

JAR SEALS.

A cheap and effective way of sealing jars of jelly, marmalade, jams, preserves, milk and plenty of tissue paper cut into squares of sufficient size to cover the rims. Proceed by dipping the jar, as usual, and fill the vessels with the fruit rolling hot run thru the tissue paper enough to ward but not to break them, and lay immediately over the top edge. Press down with the finger, and the jar will be sealed. The tissue paper will form a perfect parchment.

Famous Thirteenth Regiment of Hamilton Will Hold Big Celebration Next Month.

HAMILTON, Aug. 22.—The famous Thirteenth Regiment of Hamilton, on Sept. 13, 14 and 15, will celebrate the semi-centennial anniversary of the date on which it was gazetted and plans are now going forward for a reunion that promises to make the three dates mentioned memorable ones. The program will be decidedly brilliant. On Dec. 11, 1862, the dates of the celebration have been fixed for mid-September as the weather at the time is usually very enjoyable.

In the fifty years of its life over 12,000 men have passed through the ranks of the regiment, and those who have left are scattered throughout Canada and the United States. Col. Sir J. M. Gibson, Lieutenant-General, and Commander of the Ontario, is an ex-commander of the regiment, and was for a number of years one of Canada's reliable men on the "Wimbledon" and "Brierley" teams. Staff-Sergeant T. H. Hayhurst is another famous shot of the regiment. He holds the Queen's prize. The Thirteenth Royal was always strong on shooting and its third commander, Col. Skinner, was the man who collected the funds for and organized the first Wimbledon team.

The executive in charge of the affair has to make a public get into touch with all members of the regiment, all of whom will be personally invited to the celebration after they register their names at the service at Nordheimer's music store, 18 West King-st., Hamilton.

The celebration will be well worth while attending. On Friday, Sept. 13, in the evening a brilliant smoking concert will be held. Saturday, it will be a big day. A huge picnic will be held at which all members and ex-members of the regiment will make merry at all kinds of games, amusements and entertainments. On Sunday graves of old comrades will be decorated and an open air service will be held.

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

ANY person who is the head of a family, or any male over 16 years of age, who has been a resident of the Dominion of Canada for at least one year, and who is a citizen of the Dominion, may apply to the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-agency for a grant of land.

Entry by proxy may be made at any time, and certain conditions of residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years must be complied with. The minimum area of land is one quarter section, or 40 acres, and may be increased to 80 acres, 160 acres, 320 acres, 640 acres, 1280 acres, 2560 acres, 5120 acres, 10240 acres, 20480 acres, 40960 acres, 81920 acres, 16384
