A W DOES JAPAN NEED CURBING? EUROPE INCLINES THAT WAY

Russia's Persistence for "an Honorable Peace" Will Likely Be Backed up by Caucasian Powers.

St. Petersburg, July 17.-The Novoe Vremya to-day prints the following statement of Russia's position, which may be inspired:

"Russia can consent only to such a peace as will not affect the dignity or vital interests of the empire. To act otherwise would be fatal to Russia pulsne judges, \$9000 (now \$6000); exchequer court judge, \$8000 (now \$6000). The traveling allowances of judges are to be moving expenses and \$6 a day when absent from home. and would threaten all Europe. Europe no longer believes in Japan assurances that she will not restrict European interests in the far east. Even in England and America the voices of moral instigators can be heard in favor of the indirect interference of the powers to moderate Japan's demands. Our plenipotentiaries must remember that they must defend the interests, not only of Russia, but also of the

PHOTOGRAPHING JAMAICA DEFENCES American Doctor is Under Arres

Kingston, Ja., July 17 .- Dr. Franklin Clarke, an American, was arrested here to-day for breach of the official Secret

Service Act.
Some days ago, Dr. Clarke was discovered taking photographs of the forts protecting Port Royal and Kingston. The police found the photographs on him. The prisoner, who is a graduate of Harvard, has been a resident here for four months.
