NIAGARA FRUIT GROWERS HOLD THEIR CONVENTION

Methods of Stamping Out San Jose Scale Explained by Experts on Horticulture.

St. Catharines, March 8.—(Special.)—The convention of the Niagara District Fruit Growers opened here this morning. The attendance was large, and a practical address was delivered by Prof. Dr. Fletcher, entomologist at the Dominion Central Experiment Farm, Ottawa.

Dr. Fletcher reviewed the great work done in stamping out the San Jose scale, and claimed that it was the only way to prevent its further spread, it was due to the failure of growers to spray their orchards.

"The scale is in subjection," he said, "and united and persistent action will overcome the drawbacks of the past five years."

Afternoon Professor Surface of the Pennsylvania Experimental Farm, Harrisburg, Pa., pointed out how from one scale no less than 1,384,164.00 are brought into existence in one year.

At the session to-night addresses on horticultural subjects were delivered by Prof. Surface, Dr. Fletcher, Prof. C. C. Creelman of Guelph, and Prof. F. W. Fletcher of the Michigan Agricultural College at Lansing, Michigan. The convention will continue to-morrow.

He stated that yesterday the G.T.R. had withdrawn its application for the repeal of the penny a mile clause passed by the parliament in 1902. It was said that this withdrawal was prompted by the government. If the government had been in charge of the railway, it would not have been so easily persuaded to do so.

"It is no answer," continued Mr. Maclean, "to say, 'Oh, the member for South York, who is the chairman of the committee, has said that the clause cannot be enforced by any legal quibbling by the minister.' This is a government's own statement. It is no answer."

New York, March 8.—Central office detectives and representatives of private agencies are making a thorough canvass among the pawnbrokers and dealers in precious stones throughout the city in search of diamonds worth \$50,000, which were stolen several days ago from the J. Sweeney Jewelry Company of Houston, Texas.

A reward of \$10,000 has been offered for the return of the jewels. The authorities in Houston believe the thief was a New York man and that he probably will attempt to dispose of his plunder here.

Justice Clute Says Mr. Shepley's Contention is a Startling One.

The proceedings in non-jury court, where the suit of Peter Ryan against the Bank of Montreal and John D. Montgomery is being tried, were for a few moments an echo of the insurance commission. It was when George W. Fowler, M.P., of Jussel, N. B., was in the witness box, and Mr. Watson, counsel for Ryan, referred to the sale of the Ashcroft property to the Union Trust Co. This is the deal by which Fowler and some others are alleged to have cleaned up \$55,000 profits. When asked by Mr. Watson how this profit was divided, Mr. Fowler refused to answer.

Mr. Fowler told of a number of transactions between himself, Ryan, Shields and others, and of meeting Mr. Worrell, solicitor for the Bank of Montreal. Ryan's account with the bank was discussed, also the collaterals given by Ryan and held by the bank. It was agreed that witness was to pay the Ryan indebtedness and receive in return the Ryan securities and also a transfer of the bank's alleged claim against Ryan.

In reply to a question by Justice Clute, Fowler said Shields knew of the transactions in the securities, but they were not working together. The transactions were made with the bank by witness and not by Shields.

Argument of Plaintiff.
Mr. Watson then commenced his argument. He took the ground that the Banking Act forbade a bank disposing of a client's account, and that any transactions made with the bank by witness and not by Shields, and consequently void, also that there was a conspiracy and collusion on the part of Fowler, Shields, Montgomery and the bank to procure the Ryan securities, and that there was bad feeling on their part against Ryan.

Justice Clute held a night session and Mr. Shepley concluded his argument for the defence. At 11 p.m. judgment was reserved.

BANK AND ITS RIGHT TO DIVULGE ACCOUNTS

For Defence.
Mr. Shepley argued that the Banking Act, while laying down the law that no one, not being a bank director, had a right to inspect a customer's account, yet there must be limitations to such a privilege. He contended that anyone buying a bank claim should have every right to know the particulars of such customer's account.

Justice Clute remarked that if it were known that banks could sell or transfer to other parties a customer's account, it would paralyze commercial business and any bank claim should have every right to know the particulars of such customer's account.

Mr. Shepley maintained that the bank had a legal right in following his course, a statement to which his lordship strongly dissented.

Of Great Interest.
Mr. Watson added that this was a suit of great interest and importance to the public, that no case of such a kind had ever arisen before and he hoped would never arise again, and he trusted his lordship would give judgment on the facts of the case, taking full consideration of the credibility of certain witnesses.

A WARNING TO LAURIER TO EXTEND BOUNDARIES
Premier Roblin Sums Up the Significance of the Elections.

Winnipeg, March 8.—(Special.)—The latest results from the province show that the Conservatives have swept the constituencies.

The delayed figures to-day give 26 Conservatives and 10 Liberals, with delayed elections in two ridings, Gilbert Plains and Gimli.

In the case of Arthur, Williams (Liberal) is elected over Lyon (Con.) by a majority of 3. Dauphin has gone Liberal.

Premier Roblin says: "The issue before the electors was: 'Shall Manitoba have equality among the provinces that go to make up the Dominion or shall she be the postage stamp province,' as people in Eastern Canada sneeringly call us. The people of Manitoba have answered emphatically in favor of equality and justice. I trust that the pronouncement has been made loud and clear enough so that Sir Wilfrid Laurier will have heard what the people of Manitoba want in this connection."

"I also accept the vote as an endorsement of the general policy of government."

"I hope that Sir Wilfrid Laurier will see the necessity of enlarging the boundaries of Manitoba before the present session of parliament is prorogued. I will not take or accept of any territory less than what is ours in law, and in taking that view I am doing no injustice either to Ontario or the one hand or Saskatchewan on the other."

Edward Brown said that the opposition had a good fighting force, and this was not the time to give up the fight. Only weak-kneed men would do this. They must go on and expose the rascality of the present administration, and they would be able to do it, he thought, so that the government themselves would run away from the exposures.

At any rate he had succeeded in arousing the conscience of the people, and he would continue to do his duty as a citizen regardless of results.
