The Question of Expediency.

Nor from the standpoint of expediency do I think it would be wise or prudent for this Government to recognize at the present time the independence of the so-called Cuban Republic. Such recognition is not necessary in order to enable the United States to intervene and pacify the island. To commit this country now to the recognition of any particular Government in Cuba might subject us to embarrassing conditions of international obligation towards the organization so recognized. In case of intervention, our conduct would be subject to the approval or disapproval of such Government; we would be required to submit to its direction and to assume to it the mere relation of a friendly ally. When it shall apppear hereafter that there is within the island a Government capable of performing the duties and discharging the functions of a separate nation, and having, as a matter of fact the proper forms and aftributes of nationality, such Government can be promptly and readily recognized and the relations and interests of the United States with such nation adjusted.

Washington, D.C., April 11.-The report of the Department of Agriculture for April 1 makes the average condition of winter wheat 86, against 81.4 last April and 77,1 wheat 86, against 81.4 last April and 77.1 on April 1, 1896.
