

IT WAS MRS. GUILFORD

Detective Carpenter Settles the Question Beyond a Doubt.

Has a Photo of the Woman Which Tallies With the "Mrs. Wilbur" Who Sailed on the Vancouver - Railway Men Return From New York - Sir William Van Horne on a Tour of Inspection.

Montreal, Sept. 29. (Special.) - Detectives Carpenter has settled beyond any doubt the question of the identity of the woman who sailed from this port on the Vancouver on Friday, the 17th inst., under the name of Mrs. Wilbur. It was Mrs. Nancy Guilford, wanted at Bridgeport, Conn., for the killing of Emma Gill.

While some thought that Mrs. Wilbur and Mrs. Guilford were one and the same person, there was nothing positive known until now. Mr. Carpenter received a photo of Mrs. Guilford last evening and it was identified beyond the slightest question as that of the woman who was at the Place Viger Hotel on Friday, the 17th inst., in a second-class passage on the Vancouver at 6:30 p.m. and later in the evening went on board.

The charge against Mrs. Guilford will be held in manslaughter, not murder, as has been supposed. There is no law upon the Connecticut statute books which charge a man with murder on the ground that he was in a room with a woman who was killed.

Dr. Nancy Guilford disappeared from her home, No. 51 Gilber-street, Bridgeport, Tuesday, Sept. 13, the day following the finding of the trunk of Emma Gill's body, and arrived in Montreal on the night of the 15th.

SPANISH SECRECY.

An Air of Mystery Surrounds All Their Movements in Cuba

Just Now. Havana, Sept. 29. - Mystery and secrecy surround all the official acts of the Spanish Government. Especially was this the case in examining the remains of Columbus, and this fact has caused much unfavorable comment and given rise to grave rumors which, though unconfirmed, appear to have some foundation. The latest rumor is that the remains of the admiral were kept at a distance from any source. The removal of the remains, which should certainly have been a public ceremony, was veiled in the most mysterious manner. The remains were guarded by an armed force. A few of the authorities were placed in the niches of those who were to attend being handed to the Chief of Police the night before in General Blanco's own handwriting. The Chief of Police suggested that the ceremony would be made by the press upon the secrecy of the proceedings, and asked whether it would not be advisable to allow the representatives of the press to be present. To this General Blanco emphatically refused to accede, telling the Chief of Police to limit himself to the duty of his office.

No official account of the ceremony or statement regarding the conditions of the remains being made public, but it has leaked out from an almost authoritative source that they are not in exactly the same condition as they were when they were placed in the casket. The remains were placed in the casket on a small cart, and were then taken to the cathedral on the occasion of a funeral.
