Headquarters at Junction.

TRAINMAN MEETS A TRAGIC DEATH

Toronto Junction, Feb. 5.—Plans of the route which the Hamilton and Toronto Electric Railway will take through this town were today filed in the Toronto registry office. The line will not run as first surveyed from the station portion of the town. The old belt line railway is to be used and the line will probably enter the city at or near Hurontario street. Toronto Junction is evidently to be the headquarters for the Grand Trunk Railway, and the present station is to be erected for dis-
seminating the current from the Falls. Both these purposes are north of St. Clair street, where the Union Stock Yards purposes are being carried out. The Grand Trunk Railway Company is beginning to take a little interest in the Grand Trunk Railway, and the company has been purchased by the C.P.R., residing at 315 East Dundas street, with his death at Agincourt, he was caught by a passenger train going west and thrown under his own train.
