He spoke so low that those at a little distance could not hear what he said, and considerable curiosity was excited concerning the tenor of his remarks. The Berlin Tageblatt asserts that he referred to the Von Brusewitz murder, which has excited so much popular indignation against brutal military officers, who take advantage of their uniforms to assault and kill civilians who unintentionally trench upon what the officers call their honor. The paper says that the Emperor warned the officers against lowering the honor of their position by appearing in public when excited by wine. If, however, they were obliged to use their swords in self-defense, they should do so in the most effective manner. The London Daily News, commenting on the above, compares his Majesty's remarks with an invitation to commit murder.
