Need of Reciprocity

"It would be well to have done with the catchwords and the shopworm platitudes that cluster like barnacles upon the argument for and against reciprocity. It is true that the wisest minds in both countries, when broadened by large experience, have almost uniformly confessed the need and the benefit of reciprocity as a proper condition for modern trading. But in this special case the plea for more liberal trade relations is negatived only by unreasoning individual selfishness.

"Hold political considerations aside, consult the interest of the whole community and determine this matter of business by business principles. The conclusive argument for reciprocity with Canada always has been and must be the experience of the several American states. Had it not been prohibited by the constitution, each state of the




