STOCK EXEMPT.

Customs Regulations on Importation of Nursery Stock. In connection with the customs regulations regarding the entry of nursery stock, collectors of customs have been notified that the following are exempt: Greenhouse plants (with exception of roses), such as palms, ferns, orchids, cacti, chrysanthemums, azaleas, begonias and carnations. Herbaceous perennials (tops of which die in winter), such as perennials phlox, dielytra, peonies and perennial sunflowers. Herbaceous bedding plants, such as geraniums, coleus, verbenas and pansies. All conifers. Bulbs and tubers, such as lilies, hyacinths, narcissus, gladioli, cacti, daffodils, lilies, canna and dahlias.
