of cooling their throats.

dumb brutes," said a dog fancier today,  
"before this hot spell is over many dogs  
will have to be shot or the community  
will be in danger of being bitten by them."

their kit bags. Beneath a scorching sun,  
these men, many wounded in  
France, found the march from the C.  
P. R. depot to the barracks a severe  
tax on their strength. Two were over-  
come on Oxford street and were placed  
on street cars and taken to their des-  
tination. Had there been a sufficient  
number of motor cars on hand these  
men would not have been compelled  
to make the march.

As it was, only eleven came through  
the downtown streets on the way to  
the Military Convalescent Hospital.  
Cars were furnished for these men.
