

Reaps Where He Never Sowed; Magic Field, Unsown 12 Years, Yields Fine Crop of Wheat

DUART, July 24.—George Haycroft, a farmer living south of here, has just cut and gathered a crop of wheat heavy enough to repay him well for the cost of harvesting, from an acre field in which wheat has not been sown for twelve years.

Last year the field was tilled and planted with barley which was reaped, but this year no crop of any kind was planted. In spite of this a good crop of wheat sprang up and has now been harvested.

The acre on which this phenomenon in agriculture occurred is cut off from the rest of the field to which it belongs by a large ditch used as a drain. The drain was built a dozen years ago, and the acre field which it separates from the rest of the field had not been cropped since the drain was built, with the exception of last year's barley.

Haycroft claims that there is no mistake about the wheat having grown of its own accord, unless somebody kindly sowed it this spring unknown to him.

ALL DANGER OF POSTAL STRIKE APPARENTLY OFF

Toronto Letter Carriers Receive Information From Department.

BONUS IS RETROACTIVE

Will Be Paid Semi-Monthly at Rate of \$420 a Year.

TORONTO, July 24.—All danger of a strike of the letter carriers of Toronto is off apparently. They had demanded information from the department at Ottawa as to the salary and bonus under which they were working, upon which questions they seemed to be very much in the dark, and had intimated that if this information were not forthcoming today they would go strike on Friday. The information came, and was delivered by Postmaster Lemon at the meeting of the letter carriers tonight in Victoria Hall. He had received it through Deputy Postmaster General Coulter.

It was to the effect that the letter carriers here were working on the old salary basis of \$350 per annum, and that the bonus which had been cut off, would be paid at the rate of \$420 a year semi-monthly, the bonus to be retroactive from April 1.

There was an erroneous impression that the postal clerks of this city were joining the letter carriers in a mass meeting tonight and making demands upon the Government. A few postal clerks attended the letter carriers' meeting, but they showed little sympathy with the carriers.

An intimation was given to the letter carriers that they would not receive backing from either London or Windsor if they walked out. It seemed to be regarded as a local fight the carriers were in, and the letter carriers in other Ontario cities did not show much interest in it.

CHATHAM LIBERALS WILL HEART DEWART AT AUGUST RALLY

Other Prominent Reformers Will Also Speak at Big Convention.

CHATHAM, July 24.—Hartley Dewart, K.C., M. P. P., will be the principal speaker at the big Liberal rally to be held here August 15th. It was announced today. Other prominent Liberals will also speak at the convention, which has been called for the purpose of rallying the nomination given to R. L. Brackin, two years ago, as the Liberal candidate for the Provincial Legislature.

As yet there have been no indications of any activity by the Conservative party. R. L. Brackin has a large number of staunch supporters here, and they have prevailed upon him to hold a meeting

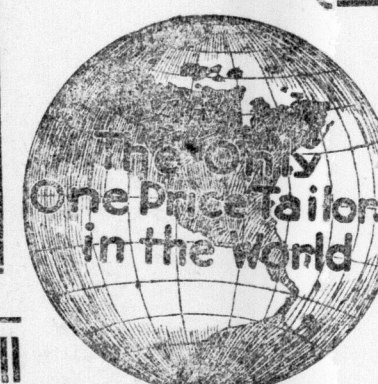

REORGANIZATION OF CANADIAN MILITIA BEING CONSIDERED

Perpetuate Names and Traditions of Battalions Which Fought in War.

OTTAWA, July 24.—The policy of the Dominion Government in regard to the reorganization of the military forces of the Dominion is likely to be definitely decided upon this autumn in time to be announced at the special sitting of the House to be convened in October for the special purpose of ratifying the peace treaty.

Some months ago, a special committee was named to consider the question of the after-the-war military establishment. This committee is now at work, and will probably be in a position to make a report to the minister of militia within a few weeks. In connection with the organization of the militia forces on a new and permanent basis, it is proposed to perpetuate the names and traditions of all the best-known militia regiments before the war as well as the names of regiments which rendered distinguished service in the war.

The committee before making its report will consult the people of the cities, towns and districts throughout the Dominion with a view to ascer-

taining their views as to the names to be borne by the volunteer military units to be raised in these communities.

ATTACHMENT OF ACCOUNTS.
KINGSTON, July 24.—Attaching orders against the accounts of Archbishop Sparatt were taken out this afternoon by A. B. A. F. OF L. OFFICIAL TAKES ISSUE WITH O. B. U. CHAIRMAN

Denies International Officers Get \$4,000 to \$15,000.

ORGANIZER SATISFIED

R. A. Rigg Is Pleased With Progress Toward Reorganization of Trades Council.

WINNIPEG, July 24.—William Varley, Toronto, general organizer of the American Federation of Labor, last night took direct issue with W. A. Pritchard, chairman of the central executive of the One Big Union, on the assertion that international officers were receiving salaries ranging from \$4,000 to \$15,000.

"It is not a fact," said Mr. Varley, "and Mr. Pritchard very well knows it. International officers are getting \$2 a week more than the scale fixed for its officers by the O. B. U. The O. B. U. men get \$40 and hotel expenses and the international officers get \$42 and

hotel expenses. In some few cases like that of Samuel Gompers, the salaries for organizers are higher."

R. A. Rigg, organizer in the west for the Dominion Trades Congress, stated last night he was well satisfied with the progress being made towards the reorganization of the Winnipeg Trades and Labor Council and the re-forming of it on lines of real affiliation with international trades unionism.

KEEP INTERNATIONAL AFFILIATION

WINNIPEG, July 24.—The telephone operators' section of the Electrical Workers' Union last night after a discussion of the merits of the One Big Union, decided to retain their international affiliation. It was also stated that the electrical workers' body generally was taking a similar view of the case, but the ballot in this connection will not be taken until about three weeks hence.
