## QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS.

Will you kindly tell me the proper weight and height for a girl 14 and a boy 18 years of age?—H. L. Ans.—The average figures are, for a girl, 100 pounds and 60 inches, and for the boy 88 pounds and 58 inches.

**Enlarged Tonsils.**  
When my son was 6 years old he suffered much with tonsillitis, each cold bringing the tonsils a little larger. The doctor in our section ordered removal of the tonsils. Finally I took him to an eye, ear, nose and throat specialist, who gave this prescription: Iodine 1 ounce, cod liver oil 1 ounce, syrup iodide of iron, 1/2-ounce. Directions: A teaspoonful after meals. Take until very warm weather is in.  
My son was cured, the tonsils being removed by the iodide and the cod liver oil. Some honest doctor, don't you think?
