

OBJECTIVE OF WELFARE FUND IS VERY NEAR
Canvass by Commercial Travelers Nets \$12,125 For the Good Work.
STILL MORE TO COME
Will Be Several Days Before Complete Total Can Be Announced.

With \$12,125.93 obtained as the result of the Saturday and Sunday canvass by the Commercial Travelers of London, the total of the United Welfare Campaign Fund is now approximately \$140,000. Some further contributions obtained by the special list committee are to be added in, and a great bulk of the returns from the canvass of employers of manufacturing and mercantile establishments, railroads and public utilities, have not yet been made. When all returns are in, it is hoped that the grand total will not be too far below the original objective set for the fund of \$150,000.

The canvass was a parade headed by Sgt. Macdonald's Highland Pipe Band, following a dinner to the team in the Regent House Saturday afternoon. C. W. Maguire, chairman of the house-to-house canvassing committee, presided, and announced that the host of the day wished his name to be not announced (somebody whispered, however, that it was). He then led the team, which included the band, and President George M. Field of the United Welfare Fund Association, and Mr. Adams, president of the Travelers' Association, spoke briefly.

Mr. Adams thanked the members of the association for so loyally responding to the appeal, and for their assistance, and Mr. Field referred to the splendid campaign they had made last December for the same purpose. It was a wonder and an achievement, said Mr. Field, that in a contribution from every home in the city, J. H. Laughton referred to the significance of the day, the anniversary of the battle of San Juan, when the Princess Pats so bravely and victoriously held out against the Germans.

The results of the house-to-house canvass are regarded as very encouraging. Many of the returns by the employees' canvass organization will be available today, but it may be several days before the complete total is announced.

BIRD NOTES

This morning 62 different kinds of birds were observed by two parties, one going south of the city, the other west. A number of these were species which had arrived during the night. Every morning now several new birds are seen.

A clear whistled "pheen" from the thick, damp woods announces the return of the very oriole. He is heard to sing a little touch of cheeriness to the summer woods.

The Baltimore Oriole sings his melodious "peter-peter" from the treetops. Soon he will begin his haunting nest from the branch of the old elm.

The Cape May warbler, somewhat yellow, with chestnut, ear patch, and breast and sides streaked with black, silently searches the willows for insects. This rather rare warbler is apparently becoming more common.

Six swallows sat on a branch of a dead tree, preening their feathers in the morning sun. The nearest probed by the brownish-grey back and grey band across the white breast to be a bank swallow. Another, the house swallow, plainly showed his white forehead, steel-blue back, and buffy upper tail coverts. Before the arrival of the house sparrow, cave swallows were seen around every eave, and eating all the insects in sight.

The blue-green heron, the last new bird for the morning, was of especial interest, as it had not been seen for some years. It was nesting in the oak woods west of London, and it is hoped his arrival this spring indicates his intention to make his summer home in this locality once more.

POLISH ARMY TAKES KIEV FROM RUSSIANS
Warsaw, May 9.—(By Associated Press).—Polish cavalry entered the city of Kiev Saturday morning on the heels of the retreating bolsheviks. The city has been evacuated by the bolsheviks. The Polish forces kept up their advance on the city their cavalry forces keeping in touch with the bolsheviks.

There was little fighting, according to reports reaching Polish headquarters in Warsaw, the cavalry going into the city all day as the infantry advanced in a great semi-circle. A few machine-gun shots were fired in the early morning as the cavalry appeared, but this was quickly silenced, and reports say that the evacuation of Kiev began soon after, or as soon as the advancing troops appeared in force.

FLOUR PRICES WILL ADVANCE \$2 PER BBL.
On Account of the Maximum Prices for Wheat Being Raised.

Flour will advance from \$1.50 to \$2 a barrel because of the raising of the maximum price for wheat. The London Flour Mills, Limited, stated today. The millers are indifferent to the advance on wheat, because they have been manufacturing under disadvantage all along. Because of the heavy export of wheat from Canada, the Canadian millers cannot count on a steady supply to keep their mills going all the time. The Canadian millers are now being forced to accept a certain amount of flour or other grain in exchange for wheat. More wheat manufactured into flour in Canada would mean cheaper flour and more wages for Canadian mill workers, as well as cheaper operating expenses for the manufacturers. It would also mean cheaper bread and shorts for the Canadian stockman. Every bushel of wheat exported takes out of the country a bushel of shorts, and the country that would be fed to Canadian live stock, if flour were exported instead of the shorts.

Asked what would follow if the wheat board would just quit business, Mr. Hunt said that temporarily the price of wheat would jump anywhere up to \$5, but after a little soaring like this, the price would come back to normal because increased production would naturally follow.

At the present time the only man who benefits is the straight grain grower. The mixed farmer and the stock raiser are both hurt, and the stock raiser and the miller, through so much wheat being exported.

RATHER 1,000 SOLDIERS' AID COM. HANDLES 170 CASES DURING PAST MONTH
1 URGEE MAN

Bishop Fallon Attacks Moral Uplifters.
LAUGH AT THEM
Until They Launch Campaign Against Divorce—Ministers Make Comments.

"I would rather have a thousand drunkards than one divorced man," said Rt. Rev. Bishop Michael F. Fallon, breaking off in the questioning of a confirmation class at St. Mary's Church Sunday night to launch into a vehement and vigorous tirade against divorce, in which he incidentally scored the moral uplifters for not opposing the proposed changes in provincial laws on the matter.

The uplifters tell you, you will go to hell if you buy a newspaper on Sunday, but you can have one Mrs. X. on Monday and a different Mrs. Y. on Thursday. What is the taking of a drink, or attending a horse race compared to the breaking up of a Christian home?" asked Bishop Fallon.

He added that he was not aware that anyone had ever gone to hell through smoking a cigarette. The uplifters were horrified at a man taking another drink but satisfied if he took another wife.

When he was a boy, he had gone to horse races and found them interesting. The divorce bill, he declared, was ten thousand times worse than anything the uplifters had been bawling and hummering for the last ten years.

Where were the uplifters now, he asked, when the people of Ontario and Prince Edward Island were having divorce laws enacted for them without asking for them?

"Let the uplifters launch a campaign against divorce, and we Catholics will back them to a man, but until they do we will laugh at them," said the bishop.

Rev. Dr. R. G. Peever, of the First Methodist Church, said Bishop Fallon was entitled to his own opinions. Besides Dr. Peever would like to be certain that the bishop had been reported correctly before he took issue with the charges made against the moral reform forces.

"We have to live together in the same town. It's better for me not to say anything, don't you think?" said Dr. Peever.

Rev. Harry B. Ashby of St. Matthew's Anglican Church, was hurriedly leaving to attend the synod meeting at Brantford, and had read a report of Bishop Fallon's service.

"He's getting very broad, isn't he?" said Mr. Ashby, who was in reference to Bishop Fallon, describing his remarks as "interesting."

TORONTO JEWS HOLD BIG DEMONSTRATION TO SHOW GRATITUDE
Allied Decision To Restore Palestine Causes Rejoicing.

Rev. W. B. McIntosh of King Street Presbyterian Church, declared that Bishop Fallon was "trying to slam the door in the face of the social reform organizations were favorable to easy divorce measures. The moral reformers, said Mr. McIntosh, stood firmly for proper marriage regulations, intemperance and infidelity were both evils, and both were brutal, and women had suffered inconceivably from the results of both. There might be no sound of the only remedy. With proper marriage regulations enforced, there would not be so many unhappy marriages, so many demanding divorce.

"The Difference," said Mr. McIntosh. "The Roman Catholics magnify the canon law."

Among the organizations which Bishop Fallon mentioned as having for twelve years subjected the province to "an orgy of moral uplifting," were the Dominion Alliance, the Anti-Cigarette League, the Anti-Betting League, the Anti-Social Club, the Women's Christian Temperance Union and the Referendum Committee.

"We are not opposing cigarettes," said Mr. McIntosh. "We are opposing their use by immature persons, who are seriously harmed by them."

PUNCHING CHINAMAN COSTS 2 YOUNG MEN TEN DOLLARS EACH
Andrew Foster and Paul Scott Fined in Police Court.

Because Willie Lee of the Royal Cafe would not satisfy their appetites on Sunday night, Andrew Foster and Paul Scott each hit him in the left eye, but very cleverly with the high cost of punching, for each was fined \$10 and costs in police court this morning.

At 10 o'clock on Sunday the pair went into the cafe and ordered a meal. They sat down with their coats and hats on and began to play a little pool. Willie Lee, who in English means "The Hope," with "God Save the King," "Rule Britannia" and "The Maple Leaf Forever."

ILDERTON
ILDERTON, May 8.—Farmers have been busy the past week and much of the spring grain has been sown. The weather has been ideal for the work and many will think the week. In fact, some few are already done and are preparing the corn and root ground.

Fall wheat in some fields is not looking so well, as owing to the continued dry weather with frosty each night, the pastures and meadows have been kept so dry that the growth has stopped. A warm rain is badly needed, both for the wheat, also for the pastures and meadows.

Some cattle were turned out this week and many more will go out on Monday.

The Ilderton fruit growers report good prospects for all kinds of fruit. "It is as far as the blossom goes, all kinds, apples, pears, plums and cherries are loaded with blossoms and one prominent fruit grower claims the unusual cold backward spring is just what was needed for the safety of the bloom, as an early bloom is always fraught with danger from frost, but now it looks as though it may be around May 24 before full bloom is on the apple orchards.

Welfare Workers Make 166 Calls, While \$9,000 Is Advanced To Soldiers.

There are still numerous calls for assistance from families arriving in the city, according to the monthly report of the soldiers' aid commission ending on April 30. The most serious matter the commission has to contend with is the shortage of houses for families which are coming to London. The report states that the situation is becoming serious, and that something will have to be done in the near future, as there is no place in which these families may take shelter.

During the month 170 cases were handled by the commission. This number 20 were new. The welfare workers made 166 calls during the month and rendered assistance to the amount of \$175. Of this amount \$37 was expended in orders given for fuel, food, transportation and clothing. The remainder, \$138 was expended in supplies from the commission storehouse and included groceries, clothing, shoes, bedding and a baby carriage.

The amount of \$9,011.30 was advanced to soldiers or their dependants, 129 people recipients.

The following is the financial statement of the commission:

Number of advances made, 129; amount advanced, \$9,011.30; number of repayments, 117; amount repaid, \$6,250.59; number of accounts on books, 264; balance outstanding, \$2,054.33; total number of advances to date, 3,023; total amount advanced to date, \$35,054.19.

Relief Fund.
Receipts—Tuxeter Women's Institute, Camiache, \$50; I. O. D. E. Stratford, \$25; George Holloway, Windsor, \$3. Total, \$78.

Disbursements—Food, \$17.38; clothing, \$115; medicine, \$10; miscellaneous, \$3.47. Total, \$43.70.

Eighty-seven men applied for positions, 46 were placed, and 121 were referred to the Ontario Employment Bureau. Three men were referred to the S. C. R. for training, and five for medical treatment.

During the month 1,096 men used the office of the commission, which is an increase of 410 over the same month of last year. During the month of April, 1919, the office was used by 446 London men, 116 district men, and 121 were looked after by mail. In April of this year 703 London men and district men called at the office, and 174 were looked after by mail. There was a slight increase in the number of men calling, during the month, and it is expected that the cases handled will be many more than usual when the D. S. C. R. information office closes.

TORONTO CARMEN TO DEMAND 85 CENTS
Toronto, May 9.—Employees of the Toronto Cigar Company have decided to demand 85 cents an hour at the expiration of their agreement with the company. The union president, who is 55 cents an hour, and this was obtained only after a two weeks' strike last year. The decision to ask for 85 cents an hour was arrived at a mass meeting held after midnight Saturday night.

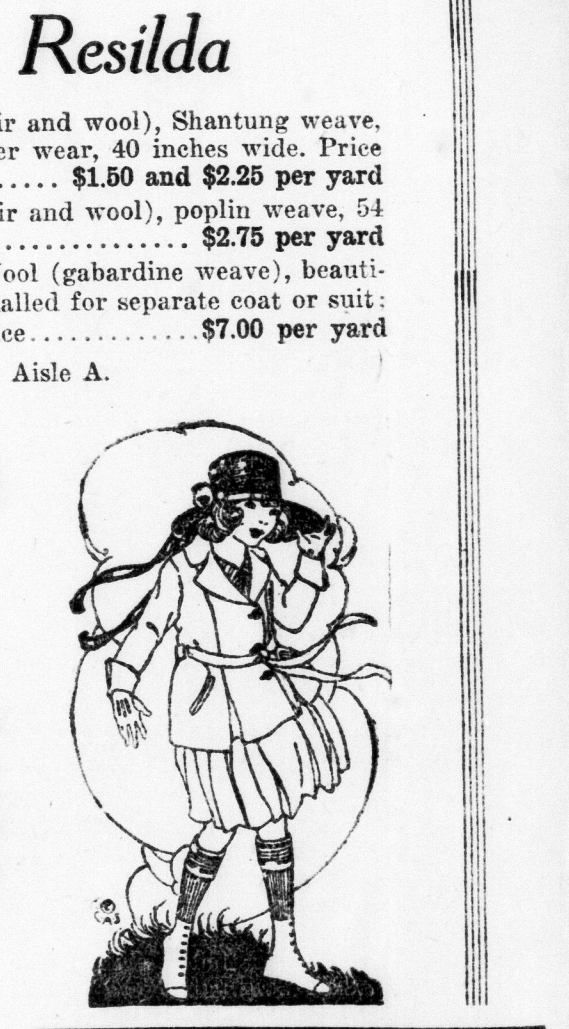

ZEPPELINS ARE SEEN GOING EAST OVER POLISH CAPITAL
Paris, May 10.—Seven German zeppelins have been seen going east over Warsaw, according to newspaper reports from the Polish capital, and it is believed they are going to Russia from Germany with military instructions.

EXPECTED AT OTTAWA.
Ottawa, May 9.—(By the Canadian Press).—His Excellency the Duke of Devonshire, governor-general, will arrive in Ottawa tomorrow morning at 10 o'clock.

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
