

FORMING SYNDICATE TO PURCHASE LOEW CANADIAN THEATRES

Montreal Report Says That \$20,000,000 Corporation Planned.

MONTREAL, Dec. 9.—It is understood in the "street" that arrangements for the formation of a new \$20,000,000 corporation, which will make an offer to the shareholders of the principal Loew's Theatres in Canada for their properties are about completed and that definite steps will be taken before the end of the week to launch the plan which has been under way for some time. There are now seven companies operating, and it is understood that offers will be made to all but Hamilton, which will continue to operate independently. The others are: Toronto, two theatres; Montreal, two theatres; London, Ottawa and Windsor.

MEIGHEN GOVT. DODGES NEEDS OF UNEMPLOYED

Robertson Passes Responsibility On To Provinces and Cities.

BUY CANADIAN GOODS

Advises Citizens To Purchase Product of This Nation's Labor.

OTTAWA, Dec. 9.—(By Canadian Press.)—The attitude of the Dominion Government toward the unemployment situation in Canada is set forth in a statement which was issued this evening from the office of the minister of labor. It is, in brief, that unemployment problems are the more direct concern of the municipality or province, and that they should be dealt with primarily by such municipality or province.

Federal aid could be given only when the problem becomes difficult to handle locally. The attitude of Canada, it is stated, is willing and anxious to do what is needed to aid the local bodies in solving the problem. But it cannot assume obligations which properly belong to a particular municipality or province. Through the department of labor the Federal Government will be glad to co-operate with the provincial authorities as necessity appears and through the department of soldiers' civil re-establishment it will continue to give special attention to disabled or partly incapacitated soldiers.

Makes No Distinction. "Obviously," says the statement, "there can no longer be any recognized distinction between the physically fit returned man and other unemployed workmen. The disabled or partly disabled returned soldier must and will continue to receive special attention."

In opening, the statement sets forth that the Government has been kept closely informed respecting the problem of unemployment and has done all possible to provide against the foreseen inevitable contraction in business. The employment service of Canada, carried on co-operatively by federal and provincial authorities, has, it is stated, secured employment for more than 500,000 men and women since March 1919.

"Up to September 1920, labor in Canada was well absorbed, Toronto, Victoria and Vancouver being the only points where unemployment was complained of," continues the statement. "At those three points unemployment was outside the city at good wages was offered during September and October for 3,400 men and practically no response. Since that time the situation is changed, in that men engaged in seasonal occupations or who had their employment through the contraction of industry, have taken the outside employment offered, so that the opportunities of two months ago no longer exist."

What Was Done. The statement reviews briefly what the Federal Government has done to try and improve the situation. The re-opening of work on the Welland Canal in 1919 gave, it says, employment to between 2,000 and 3,000 workmen. The extension of the shipbuilding program employed some more. Immigration of industrial workers had been restricted to a minimum, and 3,600 requests for skilled workers filed by Canadian employers with the department of immigration since January last, have been refused. Wherever possible home labor is being utilized.

Many employers are retaining as many of their men as possible, manufacturing stocks, the sale of which is uncertain, rather than cut down their staffs. The statement draws attention to the fact that the purchase of Canadian-made articles will help to reduce unemployment.

"If every citizen will do his or her part in giving employment, where and when possible," it closes, "and will purchase only the product of Canadian labor where obtainable, the unemployment problem will be minimized."

VETERANS WILL CONFER WITH MEIGHEN

OTTAWA, Dec. 9.—A conference on the unemployment situation between the prime minister and other members of the cabinet, and representatives of the G. W. V. A. has been arranged for tomorrow morning. This is being done as the result of a wire from the secretary of the Toronto Command G. W. V. A., asking that the premier grant an interview to Col. C. C. Williams, representing the Great War Veterans of Toronto and district, to discuss a matter of great importance to returned soldiers.

GIVEN SIX MONTHS FOR O. T. A. BREACH

Court Also Confiscates 320 Bottles of Whiskey At Guelph.

GUELPH, Dec. 9.—Six months in the Ontario Reformatory was the sentence imposed on Frank A. Jikins, of Windsor by Magistrate Watt today after he was convicted on a charge of having liquor in a place other than his private dwelling. A second charge under the O. T. A. of keeping liquor for sale was withdrawn, but on a third charge of using a license number on a motor car other than the one for which it was purchased, he was fined \$5 without costs.

John Hall, of Toronto, who was arrested with Jikins two weeks ago when the police seized 320 bottles of liquor which was found in a car in which the two men were riding, also appeared on two charges under the Ontario temperance act, but as there was no evidence to show that he owned any of the whiskey he was dismissed. The magistrate also ordered that the 320 bottles of whiskey be confiscated.

WOODSTOCK, Dec. 9.—More than 100 people attended the banquet tonight tendered by the warden of Oxford County, Dr. Atkinson of Embro, to the members of the county council and others at the Oxford Hotel. Many of the leading public business and professional men of the county were present. Following the supper the gathering was taken in charge by Rev. W. F. Lane of Embro and E. L. Sutherland of West Zorra, who acted as toast masters, and a long list of toasts were gone through. The principal speakers included E. W. Nesbitt, M.P., Donald Sutherland, M.P., Col. Sutherland, John Calder, M.P., Mayor Gahagan and members of this year's council and a number of ex-members. Interspersed with the speeches were a number of vocal and instrumental selections.
