## PLENTY OF HYDRO **POWER NEXT JUNE**

Consulting Engineer of Provincial Commission Makes Prediction.

HALIFAX, N. S., Jan. 12 .- Hydroelectric power in sufficient quantity to light Halifax, run ner tram cars, and serve a good many of the manufacturing plants of the city, will be available here next June if there is no delay in delivery of machinery and equipment, according to H. K. Smith, consulting engineer of the Nova Scotla Power Commission. Brought fifteen miles overland from the plant now under construction by the commission near St. Margaret's Bay, Halifax County, the power will cost approximately 1 cent a kilowatt hour, a price which compares very favorably with that paid in Ontario for the energy developed by the great hydro-electric system in that province. The event will mark the partial completion of the first important development of hydro-electric power by the Nova Scotla commission, ushering in what is expected to be a revolutioning plants of the city, will be available in what is expected to be a revolution-ary era in the industrial life of the

province

Up to a short time ago it was thought that the water powers of Nova Scotia, which are separately small would not be able to supply a sufficient head of water for hydro-electric systems capable of serving the power needs of the province. But engineering ingenuity having by a system of storage and intake dams overcome this difficulty, the Nova Scotia Power Commission is the Nova Scotia Power Commission in a position to undertake the estab-lishment of plants in various parts of the province, and there are engineers who foresee the time when cheap energy, gathered from her well-distrib-uted waterways, will be carried all over Nova Scotla. Such a province-wide development, even if only partially realized, would mean a tremendous ad-vance for the Blue-Nose Peninsula, with her rich natural resources ready to in a position to undertake the estab rich natural resources ready to hand for manufacture and her favor

able situation with respect to ocean trade routes of the Atlantic.


