## HAMILTON HAPPENINGS

### EX-ALDERMAN DIED ON WAY TO THE HOSPITAL

Found by Two Men Lying in Dundurn Park—Left Letter Addressed to His Widow.

HAMILTON, May 22.—(Special.)—Jos. Board, ex-alderman and a former manager of the Parisian Laundry, died in an ambulance while being taken to the City Hospital this morning. He was found lying in Dundurn Park about 7 o'clock by two men. He was 56 years of age, and was suffering from heart failure or the effects of some powerful drug. The police have a letter which was addressed to the widow, but they refuse to disclose its contents. The deceased was 33 years of age, and had lived here nearly all his life. He was an alderman for one term some years ago, and was a traveler for a number of years. About a year ago he resigned his position as manager of the Parisian Laundry. Besides his widow two children are left to mourn his loss. Coroner Anderson has the case in hand, but he does not think there is any occasion for an investigation.

### Lack of Justice.

In the First Methodist Church this morning Rev. E. E. Lansey deplored the lack of justice in Canada. He said if we were like the Puritans we would have our minister of justice called before the bar of public opinion and condemned, nor would we have a local judge throwing out the convictions of a magistrate against a man who had been found guilty of a transgression of the law. He said there was too much murder, suicide, adultery, gambling and political corruption in the country.

The tuition day campaign on Saturday for the Y.M.C.A. boys department ended slightly over \$2000. Rev. Edgar Allen, pastor of Victoria-avenue Baptist Church, in speaking of the need of a children's shelter, said that policemen should be compelled to study psychology, so that they would know how to handle children. He also said the whole educational system of Canada should be changed, because it does not meet the child's requirements. Rev. J. A. Wilson of St. Andrew's Church also appealed for a shelter.

The origin of Levy's troubles was in May, 1907, when he brought action against a Toronto firm of junk dealers to recover about \$800 for some rubber which he claims to have delivered them.
