

LITGOW SAYS BALL TEAMS CANNOT PLAY AMATEURS AND PROFESSIONALS TOGETHER

M. P. A. A. President Here Today, Makes a Statement of Particular Interest to Local Baseball Men—Any Attempt at Playing Professionals Will Mean Trouble for Amateurs.

"If the lately organized New Brunswick Baseball league plays amateurs and professional players together they do so at their peril so far as the M. P. A. A. is concerned." This is the announcement President J. C. Litgow of the Maritime body made when he arrived here from New York en route to his home in Halifax. The question of granting these special permissions was taken up by the C. A. A. U., the world body, some two weeks ago. Mr. Litgow said, when he was in Toronto. It had come up as one of the clubs of the Western Lacrosse League had asked permission to play amateurs and professionals together, and the scheme was not favored. "Therefore," said the M. P. A. A. head, "we could not grant permission for professionals and amateurs to play together in baseball, if we wanted to."
