THE Saint John Hockey Club as a body has joined the 62nd Fusiliers and in the future will play under the colors of that regiment. The team will have the full financial aid and backing of the regimental athletic committee who are now, in conjunction with Captain Brad Gilbert, rounding up all promising material and making plans for the coming winter. Under the new management, Saint John hockey fans can rest assured that every effort will be made to give them the best possible team; a team worthy of their support.

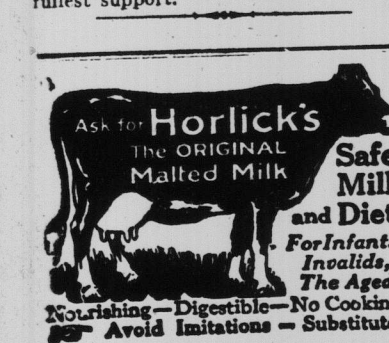
The new arrangement is part of a program being carried out by the regiment in getting young men interested in it by making it attractive to them through the formation of inter-company and regimental teams in hockey, football, basketball, indoor baseball, bowling and other sports. Committees have been appointed to deal with the various branches of sport and are ready to consider any suggestion being made. The arrangement is part of the voluntary training scheme. The pay of the men will go towards the promotion of sport and in this way teams will be assured of full financial assistance and complete equipment.

## ALL WILL TAKE PART

The regiment is commanded by Lt. Col. George Keefe and was formerly the 26th New Brunswick Battalion. The membership is now about 200 and gives promise of making the club one of the largest social and athletic clubs in the city. Due to the voluntary system of training, the officers, non-commissioned officers and men are linked together in a way previously unknown in military circles in these parts. Clubs are now being formed in the regiment and inter-company leagues are being organized. The uniforms have been designed by the uniform committee and present an attractive appearance. The uniforms are entitled to wear the colors of the regiment and in order to secure the uniform they must play in two or more senior games, making the arrangement similar to that under which all athletic clubs boasting crests are run. The athletic fund will be under the control of the general committee. The active support of the young men of the city is solicited in making the movement an unexpected success and the moral support of those too old to participate in military and sporting activities.

## TO FOSTER ATHLETICS

Military training will not be forgotten, although the main idea is to foster an interest in athletics with a view to the physical development of the young manhood of the country. All appointments of officers and non-commissioned officers will be made from members of the club. Judging by the success with which the movement has met so far it will probably be carried through to one of the most successful organizations of its kind. In linking with the regiment, the Hockey Club has shown a real confidence in the scheme and without doubt hockey fans can expect this winter to be represented by a team worthy of their fullest support.

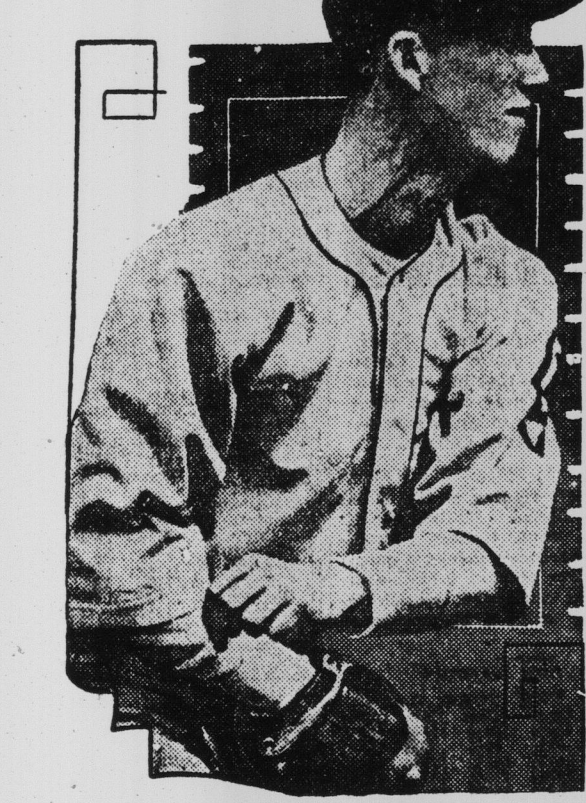
